## ISIS CENSUS 1993 INTRODUCTION By David Woodhead, Director, National ISIS

Britain's longest and deepest recession since the 1930s has blighted virtually every sector of the nation's economy and most households for more than three years. Even this year, however, it has not had a significant effect on pupil numbers in independent schools, except among boarders.

This Census is a snapshot in January 1993 of 1,366 ISIS-member schools in the United Kingdom (and a few in the Irish Republic). In that month those schools contained 469,426 pupils aged between two and nineteen. (Table 1, page 8).

To ensure that we compare like with like, comparisons are made between the 1,343 schools which participated in both the 1993 and 1992 surveys. These schools contained 465,627 pupils in 1993 and 472,600 in 1992. That reduction of 6,973 pupils represents a drop of 1.48 per cent. (Table 2, page 9). It compares with 0.23 per cent fewer pupils in 1992 and eight successive and unprecedented - years of increased numbers between 1984 and 1991.

Eighty per cent of all independently-educated pupils are in ISIS-member schools belonging to the associations of governors and heads listed on page 2. Altogether there are nearly 2,500 independent schools in the United Kingdom, educating more than 600,000 children.


Recording 1.48 per cent fewer pupils at this point during such a prolonged recession surprises no-one. A greater decline was expected by many inside as well as outside the independent sector. Indeed, the day schools - which account for four-fifths of all pupils - can claim a remarkable achievement in virtually maintaining stable numbers despite the ravages of recession. The number of day girls has increased again (by 0.09%), confirming the rising proportion of girls in ISIS schools.


Because of the increases in pupil numbers in ISIS-member schools in the eight years up to 1991 and the 8.7 per cent rise in independent schools as a whole, the independent sector is in a much stronger position to withstand this recession than it was during that of the early 1980s. The improvement in the relative strengths of schools is illustrated by the graph on page four, showing how the average size of schools has grown since 1982. This results partly

from the pupils gained up to 1991 and partly from some very sensible amalgamations of schools.

Furthermore, families make every possible sacrifice - including moving to cheaper housing and giving up expensive holidays - before sacrificing their children's education. Schools are increasingly called on to provide support from their bursary funds, particularly when a family breadwinner is hit at a crucial time in a child's prep school, GCSE or A-level course. Well over 100 pupils have been enabled to remain in their schools because their parents used the new ISIS schemes Feesure and Future Term to protect school fee payments in the event of redundancy or (for the self-employed) involuntary unemployment. About 3,000 pupils' fees are insured under the Feesure group scheme and another 600 families are covered by the individual Future Term scheme.

Graphs below show (1) the increasing proportion of children in independent schools in England since the late 1970s, based on Department for Education (DFE) figures, and (2) annual changes in ISIS-member schools since 1982, when our Census first appeared in its present form.






DFE statistics show that independent schools have been educating a steadily rising proportion of the child population. This was 5.8 per cent in England and Wales in the late 1970s and in 1992 was 7.4 per cent; in Scotland it is 4 per cent. It varies between age groups and parts of the British Isles. For example, 19.2 per cent of sixth-formers (16-19s) in England are in independent schools. In London and south-east England, 13.6 per cent of secondary school children and 11 per cent of all children were in the independent sector in 1990-91, the most recent year for which figures are available.

Independent schools' increasing 'market share' has been accentuated by the overall drop in the number of school-age children nationally which was a feature of the late 1970s and the 1980s. This was reversed in 1990-91, with a modest (0.7%) rise in overall pupil numbers in maintained sector schools in England. According to DFE provisional figures for 1991-92, maintained sector rolls overall increased by 1.3 per cent; under fives were up by 4 per cent, primary by 0.4 per cent and secondary by 1.9 per cent.

The age profile in **Table 3**, page 10, shows where numbers have grown or fallen between 1992 and 1993. There is a continuing strong demand for nursery or 'pre-prep' places for the 'rising fives' with increases of 10.7 per cent, 4.5 per cent and 2.4 per cent in two, three and four-year-olds respectively. There are modest rises in the numbers of 13 and 14-year-olds. The number of sixth-formers fluctuates: last year they recovered from a dip in 1991, but this year they are marginally down.




The decline in boarding numbers, which has been a consistent feature of the post-war independent sector, continues, with a 6.7 per cent drop in full-boarding boys and 5.4 per cent in full-boarding girls. During the seven years in which we have recorded weekly boarders separately, their numbers have been up in five of those years and down in two, including this year. It is in the boarding sector that the recession has had most effect. Many schools are already considering the need to rationalise their provision to take account of this, including the possibility of concentrating entirely on day pupils. This could result in a strengthening of the sector while continuing to provide families with a full range of choice.

School fees increased on average in 1992-93 by 8.3 per cent, compared with 12.0 per cent in the previous year and 12.6 per cent in 1990-91. Average termly fees are recorded in Table 4, page 11 and Table 6, page 13. The former includes a regional breakdown of the analysis of pupil numbers and average termly fees for full boarders, weekly boarders, day pupils in boarding schools and day schools. The latter compares percentage increases in average boarding and day fees (under school associations) over a five-year period with increases in inflation, as measured by the Retail Prices Index, average earnings (Department of Employment figures) and teachers' pay (DFE).

The past year's fee rise of 8.3 per cent is the lowest recorded since 1984-85. It reflects the continuing reductions in overall inflation and in teachers' pay awards. But, parents often ask, why are school fee rises still far outstripping inflation? They might equally well ask why education costs generally outstrip

inflation, in the maintained as well as independent sector. Costs in the former are less visible than in the latter but in both they reflect the labour and capital intensive nature of education. Local authority spending on education in 1992-93, for example, is allowed by central government to rise by 7.1 per cent - more than three times the current inflation rate.

The fourth graph illustrates the point. This shows, over seven years, the generally close correlation between the percentage growth in maintained school unit costs (as measured by the Chartered Institute of Public Finance & Accountancy) and rises in average independent school fees.




Teaching and non-teaching staff salaries are the largest items in every school budget. They account for up to 80 per cent of a day school's costs and up to 60 per cent in a boarding school. Average earnings in the population as a whole consistently run ahead of the RPI and teachers' salaries have done so in most years. In 1991-92 (April to March) the increase in teachers' pay nationally was 9.5 per cent, but this did not take account of incremental rises which can add another 2 per cent to teacher costs - or non-teaching staff. The rise in average earnings in 1992 (calendar year) was 4.5 per cent.

Small teaching groups are often cited by parents among their main reasons for choosing independent schools. They cannot have these without generous staffing which, coupled with rising salaries and non-teaching staff wages and continued improvements in facilities and equipment, largely account for fee increases. Indeed, another small improvement in staff:pupil ratios - to 1:10.7

overall and 1:12.4 with the weighting for sixth-forms - is shown in Table 2, page 9.

The Census records another increase in the number of children receiving help with school fees - up from 120,316 to 123,750, a rise of 3,434 or 2.9 per cent. (Table 7, page 14 and the fifth graph.) Most of this additional help is being given by the schools, whose bursary funds are being stretched to the limit to ensure continuity of education for children in families hit by the recession.



The proportion of children in ISIS-member schools receiving assistance with fees from various sources has exceeded 25 per cent for the first time this year. School bursaries and scholarships account for most of them - 78,863, or 16.9 per cent, compared with 76,641 (16.2%) a year ago. The next largest group (31,582 or 6.8%) hold government assisted places. Places paid for by local education authorities show another modest rise to 9,058 as do those wholly or partly funded from other sources, such as charitable trusts (4,247).

Table 8, page 15 and the sixth graph show the amount spent per pupil on new and improved buildings and equipment - and reveal another effect of recession. Investment in facilities has been maintained at a high level for many years. At £513 per pupil it is still high but, unsurprisingly at a time when schools are anxious to minimise fee rises, it is 10.0 per cent less than in the year before and total expenditure has fallen by 11.3 per cent to £239.2 million.




Table 9, page 16 records new pupils from overseas who have joined schools since the previous Census day. The number of foreign pupils coming to UK boarding schools during the year shows the biggest increase for several years - from 5,686 to 5,908, a rise of 3.9 per cent. This more than offsets the drop in British pupils whose parents live abroad or who serve in the armed forces. Encouragingly, the increase in foreign pupils is attributable to those parts of the world where ISIS International has concentrated its marketing of British boarding schools through education exhibitions and more active local representation. The largest increases are from Hong Kong and other parts of the Far East.

The attractiveness of British boarding schools to foreign families - for their academic standards, extra-curricular opportunities, pastoral care and expertise in English language teaching - is a great national asset. The long-term benefits to Britain which accrue from hosting thousands of young foreigners during at least part of their education are incalculable. The purely financial benefits in foreign currency earnings are calculable and amount to at least £130 million a year.

The seventh graph is new. It illustrates **Table 10**, page 17 and shows the rising proportion of independent school post A-level leavers going on to higher education. The table does not record post-GCSE leavers. Three of the associations - GBGSA, GSA and ISAI - include some schools which do not have sixth-forms and therefore do not offer A-level courses. Their numbers of A-level leavers need to be read with this is mind.




Table 11, page 17 records the sizes of schools - the number in membership of each association with their pupil numbers. Table 12, page 18 shows the percentage of boarders in the schools belonging to the associations and Table 13, page 18 gives boy/girl ratios.

#### GENERAL & ASSOCIATION TABLES

All the general tables are contained on pages 8 to 18. Those which follow (pages 20 to 46) relate to particular associations of schools, indicated by the initials at the top of each page.

#### DUAL MEMBERSHIP

Some schools are members of more than one association. For the sake of clarity and to avoid their statistics being counted twice, these schools are recorded in the Census under one association only. This does, however, produce distortions in the apparent size of associations.

The Society of Headmasters & Headmistresses of Independent Schools (SHMIS) appears (on page 8) as having only 49 members whereas its full membership is 68; 19 have dual membership with the Headmasters' Conference and they are shown in the HMC figures. There are 23 schools in membership of the Independent Schools Association Incorporated (ISAI) which are also in membership of other associations and do not appear in the ISAI tables.

#### **ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS**

Only two of our 1,368 member schools failed to return their Census forms. I am grateful to the heads, deputy heads, bursars, secretaries and other members of staff who co-operated and to the chairmen, president and secretaries of the associations.

Julian Bewick and the Monkton Combe Computing Service devoted many hours of patient and careful work to this survey. They must be congratulated on producing a document which is widely valued by schools, researchers, educationalists, journalists, commentators and others for the detailed information it provides on the major part of the independent sector. ### NOTES ON TABLES FOR INDIVIDUAL ASSOCIATIONS

Tables on the following pages show changes that occurred between January 1992 and January 1993.

In order that fair comparisons can be made, only those schools which completed the census in BOTH years have figures included in the tables.

A few schools changed the associations to which they belong during the year between the two census days. Their figures are included in tables for their current associations.

Age ranges for schools in England, Wales and Ireland are calculated using 1st September as a base. Those in Scotland use 1st January.

Tables 14A to 20A show numbers of pupils in the schools. Current numbers are shown in normal print, with last year's figures printed below in italics. Percentage changes are printed as the third line of each group of three lines. In cases of large percentage change, it is wise to look at the figures above to see if the change is significant.

TABLES 14B to 20B show the numbers of pupils and the average fees by areas. A blank entry in a fees or numbers column indicates that there is no school of the relevant category in the area. A blank in the per cent change row means there is no significant change.

TABLES 14C, D and E to 20C, D and E deal with staffing.

TABLES 14F and G to 20F and G deal with numbers and courses of study of sixth form pupils.

TABLES 14H, I and J to 20H, I and J show the sources of entry and destinations of leavers. Proportions shown in each category are believed to be accurate, but total numbers are higher than those shown. These tables are amongst the most difficult for schools to complete accurately as sources and destinations are not always known.


