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ISIS CENSUS 1995 INTRODUCTION By David Woodhead, Director, National ISIS

Continuing improvement


On all the indices of overall trends in pupil numbers, the 1995 Census shows an encouraging improvement on the 1994 and 1993 figures.

Day pupil numbers are up for boys and girls, whereas in the last two years only those for girls showed any increase. While numbers of weekly- and full-boarders have dropped again, the decrease is the smallest for four years and is insignificant in the case of weekly-boarding girls.

However, the increases in day numbers and the conspicuous success of British schools' recruitment overseas are insufficient to compensate for the further decline in boarders. Overall pupil numbers in ISIS-member schools are therefore down for the fourth year in succession. But they are down by only 509 pupils in a total population of more than 460,000 and this drop is less than in any of the previous three years.


The 1995 snapshot was taken in January at 1,347 ISIS-member schools throughout the United Kingdom (and five in the Irish Republic). In that month those schools educated 465,482 pupils aged between two and nineteen, 382,208 day children and 83,274 boarders. (Table 1, page 8.) Valid comparisons of pupil numbers and other trends recorded in the Census can only be made by looking at the schools whose statistics appear in two consecutive surveys. That is why the number of schools included in subsequent tables differs from the 1,347 in Table 1. Membership of the school associations which constitute ISIS (listed on the inside front cover) is another changeable factor: some schools join in the course of a year, others merge, close or leave.

The 1995 comparisons are made, therefore, between the 1,332 schools which participated in this and the 1994 survey. These schools contained 461,844 pupils in 1995 (the bold figure in the top line of the comparative table) and 462,353 in 1994 (the figure immediately below). That reduction of 509 pupils is a drop of 0.1 per cent. (Table 2, page 9.)



Between 1984 and 1991 inclusive, ISIS schools enjoyed eight years of continuous growth. The independent sector as a whole expanded by almost nine per cent. Total pupil numbers climbed to well over 600,000. Independent education's share of the child population grew to 7.5 per cent in England. (See Graph 2, page 3, based on Department for Education [DFE] figures.) The recession was eventually reflected by a mere 0.23 per cent drop in ISIS numbers in 1992, 1.48 per cent in 1993 and just under one per cent in 1994, representing a loss over three years of about 12,500 pupils (mainly boarders) from schools educating nearly half a million children. Graph 1 above shows annual changes in pupil numbers since 1982 when the ISIS Census first appeared in its present form.

ISIS-member schools are not the entire independent sector. But they represent about 80 per cent of all independently-educated pupils and their trends generally reflect what is happening among the 2,400




schools in the sector as a whole. However, new day schools which open in response to parental demand are under-represented, since ISIS members tend to be longer-established schools; conversely, boarding is proportionately over-represented in ISIS statistics as its schools contain about 85 per cent of independent sector boarders.

The picture emerging from this year's Census is one of continued gradual recovery from a long, severe recession which was slow to have an impact on independent school numbers but whose effects remain long after the recession 'ended' in a technical sense. The improvement in day pupil numbers now looks particularly firmly-based.

The confidence factor

What is still lacking is the return of the confidence which assisted the expansion of independent education in the late 1980s. Independent education is such a major financial commitment that parents are understandably nervous unless they are sure they can maintain it.

There are obvious reasons why lack of confidence still inhibits them, however healthy most economic indicators may currently be. Main salary-earners, or other earners on whom the payment of school fees depend, are still being made redundant. This seems particularly to be the case in those parts of Britain which have the heaviest concentration of independent schools. Disposable incomes of those in work are still



being eroded by tax rises. Well-publicised spectacular increases for a few top earners distract attention from the more numerous who have had no increase at all, or an increase below inflation or a bonus reduced or cancelled. And two-thirds of parents pay school fees out of their earned, taxed income.

Bearing all that in mind, the positive results in this Census are all the more remarkable. Day pupil numbers have increased overall by 2,994 or 0.8 per cent, day boys by 1,784 (0.92 per cent) and day girls by 1,210 (0.67 per cent).

Boarding

The number of weekly-boarding girls is down by a modest 32 (0.76 per cent). It has long been our belief that a revival in weekly-boarding would be one of the surest signs of recovery. Weekly-boarders have been recorded separately for nine years; their numbers were up in the first five.

But it is among parents of boarders that the confidence factor is particularly crucial, given the financial commitment involved. Among full-boarders, the best that can be said is that this year's decline in numbers is less steep than in recent years. The drop of 5.09 per cent in full boarding boys and 2.55 per cent among girls (4.14 per cent overall) is an improvement on last year's 5.22 and 5.11 per cent respectively (which was 5.18 per cent overall).

It must be remembered that about 40 per cent of the decline in boarding numbers in recent years has been attributable to the reduction in the number of boarders from service families, caused by cutbacks in armed forces personnel and changes in the Ministry of Defence Boarding School Allowance. The erosion of this traditional market for boarding education will continue to affect schools for some years.


Increasing signs of willingness among schools to respond to changes in the market by merging are welcome. A school closure is always an emotional event; fortunately, in several cases during the past year, governors of schools competing among the same clientele for boarding and day pupils have decided that merger is the sensible solution. In the independent sector as a whole in recent years, the number of schools closing has been closely matched by new schools opening. But whereas many of the closures have been rural boarding schools, new ones tend to be urban day schools.

Quality counts

What accounts for the relatively robust condition of the independent sector despite a recession which has ravaged so many other areas of commercial and professional activity? It must be parents' determination to find the fees, whatever the sacrifices involved, for a quality of education which they make their top priority.

Surveys by MORI and others show that by far the largest group of parents would choose independent schools if they could afford them; that parents overwhelmingly believe educational standards are highest in independent schools; that among independent sector parents, the factors mainly influencing their choice are good discipline, good exam results, the school's reputation, its suitability for the individual child, small classes and the development of social responsibility.

While there is more to a good education than examination results, parents' belief that independent schools are pre-eminent in examination achievement is endorsed by the Department for Education statistics demonstrating that pupils at all ability levels in independent schools achieve better A-level results than those at other schools, including selective state grammar schools and sixth-form colleges as well as comprehensive schools.




Demographic background

Overall numbers in maintained schools in England have been rising since 1990-91, following fifteen years of falling rolls. According to DFE figures for 1993-94 (the most recent available), maintained sector rolls increased by 1.9 per cent (under fives by 3.6 per cent; 5-10 year-olds by 1.5 per cent; 11-15 year-olds by 2.2 per cent. Over-16s attending sixth-form colleges are included in further education rather than school statistics).

The age profile in **Table 3**, **page 10** shows where numbers have risen or fallen in ISIS schools between 1994 and 1995. Demand remains strong for nursery or 'pre-prep' places for rising-fives, with increases of 5.3 per cent among two year-olds, 7.6 per cent among three year-olds and a rise of 4.7 per cent among four year-olds which is substantially more than last year. Six and seven year-olds are also up, by 2.7 and 2.0 per cent. Other rises are recorded among 9, 15, 16, 17 and 19 year-olds. Sixth-form numbers are up overall for the first time since 1992.

Fees and costs

School fees increased on average in 1994-95 by 4.2 per cent, compared with 2.6 per cent in the previous year, 8.3 per cent in 1992-93 and substantially higher percentages before that. Average termly




fees are recorded in **Table 4**, **page 11** and **Table 6**, **page 13**. The former includes a regional breakdown of pupil numbers and average termly fees for full- and weekly-boarders and day pupils in day and boarding schools. Table 6 compares percentage increases in average day and boarding fees (under school associations) over a five-year period with increases in inflation, measured by the Retail Prices Index, average earnings (Department of Employment figures) and teachers' pay (DFE).

The average fee rise recorded last year was the lowest for many years. The 1994-95 average is higher, but that was expected: overall inflation in 1994-95 was still low but not quite as low as in the previous year (2.4 per cent compared with 1.6 per cent) and teachers received a larger pay award (2.9 per cent rather than 1.5 per cent).

School fee rises are, above all, a reflection of increased staff costs. They are still ahead of the RPI; costs in maintained and independent schools (and, indeed, universities) generally are, but they are more visible in the independent sector. Schools are labour and capital intensive and so reflect labour and equipment costs to a greater extent than the elements which make up the RPI. Table 6 shows that the closest correlation in most years is between fees and teachers' salaries.

So teachers' and other staff salaries are the biggest items in every



school budget. They account for up to 80 per cent of a day school's costs and up to 60 per cent in a boarding school. Most independent schools pay national teachers' pay scales or more; the largest element in their budgets is therefore beyond their control. The Government pay award to teachers in April 1994 was an increase on the basic scale of 2.9 per cent. However, as most teachers receive not only this award but also incremental rises provided for in national agreements, many schools faced an overall increase in their pay bill of five or six per cent.

Educationalists and politicians argue whether class size matters. Parents don't: they want individual attention for their children and that means for many children smaller teaching groups. What happens in the classroom matters most. Fee increases are the price parents pay for generously staffed schools as well as updated facilities and equipment. Despite cost pressures in a difficult economic climate, the Census records another slight improvement in staff:pupil ratios, which now stand at 1:10.6 overall and 1:12.3 with the weighting for sixth-forms. (Table 2, page 9.)

Graph 4 illustrates fee increases since 1983 and relates them to the RPI and average earnings over the same period. The average rise in earnings for the population as a whole consistently exceeds the RPI: it was 3.7 per cent in 1994 (provisional calendar year figure), compared

with a rise in RPI of 2.4 per cent. Teachers' salaries, too, have easily outpaced the RPI in most years just on national pay awards, let alone incremental rises. Only the national awards are included in the teachers' percentage increases in Table 6.

Table 8, page 15 and **Graph 6** record spending in total and per pupil on new and improved buildings and equipment. During 1994 schools spent £231.1 million, 6.5 per cent more than in 1993; this represented £500 per pupil, compared with £469 in the year before. Greater investment in facilities suggest a return of confidence within schools at a time when they are still conscious of the need to minimise fee increases.

More pupils helped

The number of children receiving help with school fees has risen again, from 125,315 to 129,932, an increase of 4,617 or 3.7 per cent. More than 28 per cent of pupils in ISIS schools are now helped from various sources. The details are recorded in **Table 7**, page 14 and **Graph 5**. For the first time, the table records the percentage rises in each category of help and the percentages of all pupils which those receiving help represent.

Schools are giving most of the additional help. Scholarships and bursaries account for the largest group - 83,836, or 18 per cent of all pupils, compared with 80,958 a year ago. Government assisted places are held by 32,922 (seven per cent of all pupils), reflecting the increased take-up of the Assisted Places Scheme particularly at 11, the main age of entry, and the expansion of numbers which had been planned for the mid-1990s. Places paid for by local education authorities - usually in cases of need for which LEA schools cannot cater - also show a further rise to 9,090. Those wholly or partly funded from other sources, such as charitable trusts, increased to 4,084.

British schools' success overseas

New pupils from overseas who have joined schools since the previous Census day in 1994 are recorded in **Table 9**, **page 16**. This is not, therefore, the total number of overseas pupils in our schools (which is probably in the region of 18,000).

British boarding schools have achieved another year of successful recruitment, following a record increase in foreign

pupils in 1993-94. The growth in 1994-95 has been almost as great. Foreign pupils coming during the year totalled 6,779, compared with 6,300, a rise of 7.6 per cent. For the first time since these statistics have been collected, the number of children of British expatriate families enrolling in our schools has also increased (from 1,535 to 1,616, a 5.3 per cent rise). Only those whose parents serve overseas in the armed forces have fallen, as they have done every year since our records began.

Among foreign pupils, the largest increases are again from the rest of Europe and from the Far East - areas where ISIS International has concentrated its promotion of British boarding schools and recruitment of pupils, against competition from schools in North America, Australia and elsewhere.

Increased recruitment from Germany, Russia and other parts of eastern Europe, Hong Kong and Talwan in particular reflects the value of ISIS International's repeated appearances at British and international education exhibitions overseas, permanent ISIS representation locally and more active marketing by individual schools. These efforts have succeeded in reversing the decline in foreign pupil numbers which occurred in the 1980s.

Recruitment in 1994-95, for example, has increased by 4.5 per cent from the rest of Europe, by 7.0 from Hong Kong compared with less than 2 per cent growth in the previous year) and by an unprecedented 23 per cent from the Far East apart from Hong Kong. Taiwan has become an increasingly important source of pupils since 1991, when ISIS International ploneered British schools' representation at education exhibitions in Taipei organised by the Anglo-Taiwan Education Centre. This year, for the first time in the Census, we have separated Taiwan from the remainder of the Far East; 135 Taiwanese came to our schools in the past year. Combined figures for North America this year replace the previous separate statistics for Canada and the United States.

Increased recruitment is also recorded from the Middle East, Central and South America and the Caribbean. Only Africa, Australasia and North America show a slight drop.

What recruits gain by coming here are high academic standards and intellectual rigour, expertise in English language teaching.

unparalleled extra-curricular opportunities and high quality pastoral care.

What the schools and Britain gain is the long-term benefit of hosting, for part of their school education, thousands of young foreigners, many of whom will eventually occupy influential positions in their own countries. Their presence during their school years is also recognised as an opportunity for British universities to persuade them to stay in the UK for their higher education. Boarding schools earn at least £175 million per year in foreign currency.

Leavers after A-levels

Table 10, page 17 shows the rising proportion of independent school leavers going on to higher education after taking A-levels. The table does not record post-GCSE leavers. Three of the school associations -GBGSA, GSA and ISAI - include some schools which do not have sixth-forms and therefore do not offer A-level courses. Their statistics need to be read with this in mind.

Size; boarding/day; boys/girls

Table 11, page 17 records sizes of schools. Each figure under the associations represents the number of schools whose pupil rolls come in the stated range; about 900 of our schools have fewer than 350 pupils. The average size of ISIS schools is 347. See **Graph 3**.

Table 12, page 18 shows percentages of boarders; for example, there are 42 schools across all associations with 95 per cent or more boarders.

Table 13, page 18 gives boy/girl ratios. For example, there are similar numbers of all-boy and all-girl schools; the others are mixed in varying proportions.

General & association tables

All the general tables are on pages 8 to 18. Those which follow (pages 20 to 47) relate to specific associations of schools, **indicated by the initials at the top of each page**.

Dual membership

Some schools belong to more than one association, but they are recorded in the Census under one association only. This does, however, produce distortions in the apparent size of associations.

The Society of Headmasters & Headmistresses of Independent Schools (SHMIS) appears (on page 8) as having only 51 members, whereas its full membership is 71; 20 have dual membership with the Headmasters' Conference and they are included in the HMC figures. There are 18 schools in the Independent Schools Association Incorporated (ISAI) which also belong to other associations and do not appear in the ISAI tables.

Acknowledgements

This year all but two of the 1349 eligible schools returned their Census forms. I am grateful to the heads, deputy heads, bursars, secretaries and other members of staff who co-operated and to the association chairmen, president and secretaries.

Julian Bewick and the Monkton Combe Computing Service devoted many hours of patient and careful work to this survey. 

NOTES ON TABLES FOR INDIVIDUAL ASSOCIATIONS

Tables on the following pages show changes that occurred between January 1994 and January 1995.

In order that fair comparisons can be made, only those schools which completed the census in BOTH years have figures included in the tables.

A few schools changed the associations to which they belong during the year between the two census days. Their figures are included in tables for their current associations.

Age ranges for schools in England, Wales and Ireland are calculated using 1st September as a base. Those in Scotland use 1st January.

Tables 14A to 20A show numbers of pupils in the schools. Current numbers are shown in normal print, with last year's figures printed below in italics. Percentage changes are printed as the third line of each group of three lines. In cases of large percentage change, it is wise to look at the figures above to see if the change is significant.

TABLES 14B to 20B show the numbers of pupils and the average fees by areas. A blank entry in a fees or numbers column indicates that there is no school of the relevant category in the area, A blank in the per cent change row means there is no significant change.

TABLES 14C, D and E to 20C, D and E deal with staffing.

TABLES 14F and G to 20F and G deal with numbers and courses of study of sixth form pupils.

TABLES 14H, I and J to 20H, I and J show the sources of entry and destinations of leavers. Proportions shown in each category are believed to be accurate, but total numbers are higher than those shown. These tables are amongst the most difficult for schools to complete accurately as sources and destinations are not always known.
