Statistical Survey of Independent Schools - January 1994

These tables contain information derived from a survey carried out in January 1994 among members of:-

- HMC - boys' and coeducational schools whose heads are members of the Headmasters' Conference and whose governing bodies are members of GBA
- SHMIS - predominantly boys' schools whose heads are members of the Society of Headmasters & Headmistresses of Independent Schools and whose governing bodies are members of GBA
- GBA - boys' and coeducational schools whose governing bodies are members of the Governing Bodies Association
- GSA - girls' schools whose heads are members of the Girls' Schools Association and whose governing bodies belong to GBGSA
- GBGSA - girls' schools whose governing bodies are members of the Governing Bodies of Girls' Schools Association
- IAPS - schools whose heads are members of the Incorporated Association of Preparatory Schools
- ISAI - schools whose heads are members of the Independent Schools Association Incorporated but not of any other Association

The information relates to January 1994, except that expenditure on buildings and equipment is for the financial year ending at various dates in 1993.

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ISIS CENSUS 1994 INTRODUCTION

If the expression 'green shoots of recovery' had not been discredited by a former Chancellor of the Exchequer, we would be even more enthusiastic about using it now to describe what is happening in independent schools at the end of this century's second most severe recession.

Although the 1994 Census shows the third annual drop in overall pupil numbers in ISIS-member schools, it is a marked improvement on last year. Unlike then, day numbers are up overall.

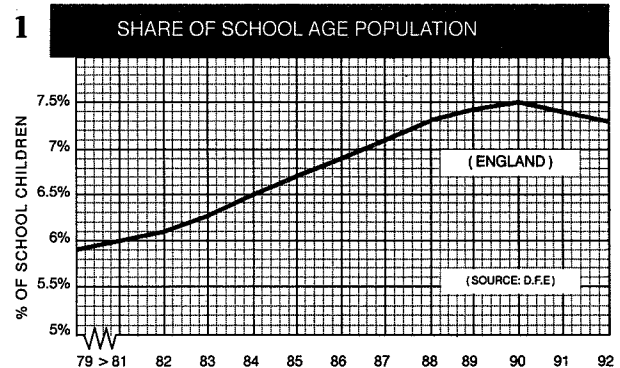
To recap: between 1984 and 1991 inclusive, ISIS schools enjoyed eight years of continuous growth. In that period the independent sector as a whole expanded by almost nine per cent. Total pupil numbers exceeded 600,000 and the independent sector's share of the child population grew to 7.5 per cent in England (see **Graph 1**), based on Department for Education (DFE) figures. The recession was eventually reflected by a mere 0.23 per cent drop in numbers in 1992 and 1.48 per cent in 1993, representing a loss of about 8,000 pupils (almost entirely boarders) over the two years.

This latest snapshot was taken in January 1994 of 1,355 ISIS-member schools throughout the United Kingdom (and four in the Irish Republic). In that month those schools contained 466,105 pupils aged between two and nineteen. (**Table 1, page 8.**)

But membership of the associations of governors and heads which constitute ISIS (listed on page 2) is fluid: some schools join in the course of a year, others merge or leave. So genuine comparisons of pupil numbers and other trends recorded in the Census can only be made by looking at the schools whose figures appear in two consecutive surveys. That is why the number of schools included in subsequent tables differs from the 1,355 in Table 1.

Comparisons in 1994 are made, therefore, between the 1,341 schools which participated in this and the 1993 surveys. These schools contained 462,719 pupils in 1994 (the bold figure in the top line of the

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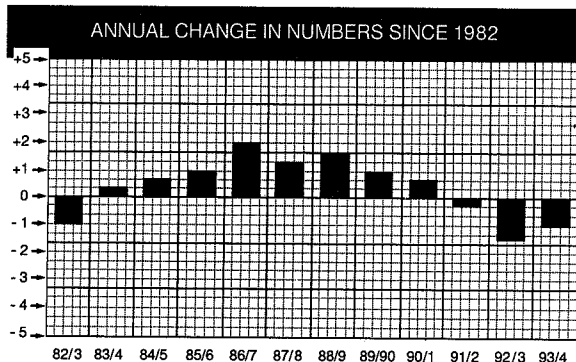
comparative table) and 467,195 in 1993 (the figure immediately below). That reduction of 4,476 pupils is a drop of 0.96 per cent. (**Table 2, page 9.**)

ISIS-member schools are not the entire independent sector. But their trends reliably reflect what is happening in the sector as a whole; there are nearly 2,500 independent schools in the United Kingdom altogether, but ISIS schools contain about 80 per cent of all independently-educated pupils.

Recovery accelerates

The improvement in day numbers, and slowdown in boarding's decline, indicates a more rapid recovery from a much worse recession compared with the equivalent point during the economic malaise of the early 1980s. Graph 2 (on page 4) shows annual changes in pupil numbers since 1982 (the year in which the ISIS Census first appeared in its present form.) The earlier sign of recovery is more remarkable bearing in mind that the recent

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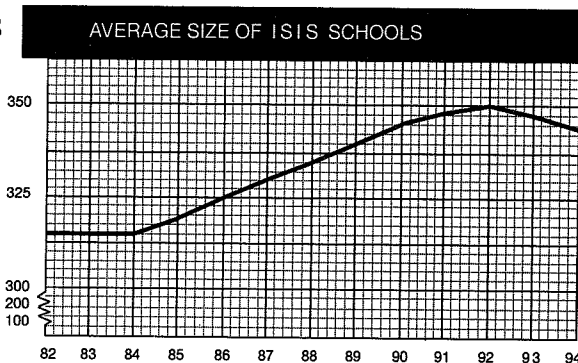
recession had a particularly adverse effect in those parts of Britain which have the heaviest concentration of independent schools. The expectations were, therefore, that our schools would suffer disproportionately badly compared with other sectors of the economy and that the effects would be more prolonged than before. Both appear to be confounded by this Census.

The survey justifies the belief that the independent sector in the 1990s is in a better position than it was fifteen years ago to withstand recession, not least because of the growth since the early 1980s in the average size of schools, as shown in Graph 3.

This year there has been an overall increase of 329 or 0.09 per cent in day pupil numbers, day girls having increased by 0.34 per cent offsetting a drop of 0.15 per cent among day boys.

The resilience of independent schools can only be explained by the determination of parents to find the fees, come what may, for educational quality which they cannot obtain elsewhere. For many this means cheaper holidays, cheaper housing and fewer luxuries because education is their top priority. We know from MORI surveys that by far the largest group of parents would choose independent schools if they could afford them; that

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parents overwhelmingly believe educational standards are highest in independent schools; that among parents whose children are in the independent sector, the factors mainly influencing their choice are good discipline, good exam results, the school's overall reputation, its suitability for the individual child, small classes and the development of social responsibility.

Predictions are hazardous: whether the recovery in pupil numbers continues will depend largely on the severity with which current direct and indirect tax increases attack parents' disposable incomes.

Boarding

Returns from boarding schools are a little more encouraging this year, too. While the overall trend is consistent with most of the post-war period, the drop of 5.22 per cent in full-boarding boys and 5.11 per cent in full-boarding girls (5.18 per cent overall) is an improvement on last year's position of 6.72 and 5.41 per cent respectively (which was 6.24 per cent overall). Weekly boarding numbers have been recorded separately for eight years. They went up in the first five and down in the last three. This year's is a smaller drop than in 1993.

One of the main factors contributing to falling boarding numbers in recent years has been the dramatic changes affecting service families, part of the traditional market for boarding schools. Cutbacks in armed

forces personnel and changes in the Ministry of Defence Boarding School Allowance reduced the number of boarders from service families in independent schools by almost 5,500 between 1988-92. **About 40 per cent of the decline in boarding numbers in those years was attributable to the services.** The same factors will continue to affect boarding for some years to come.

Fluctuations in independent school numbers no longer occur against a background of declining numbers of school-age children nationally, as was the case in the late 1970s and the 1980s. Overall numbers in maintained sector schools in England rose for the first time in 1990-91, ending fifteen years of falling rolls. According to DFE provisional figures for 1992-93, *maintained* sector rolls increased by 1.0 per cent (under fives and 5-10 year-olds were each up by 1.0 per cent; over-11s were down by 1.0 per cent, partly because over-16s attending sixth-form colleges are now included in further education rather than school statistics).

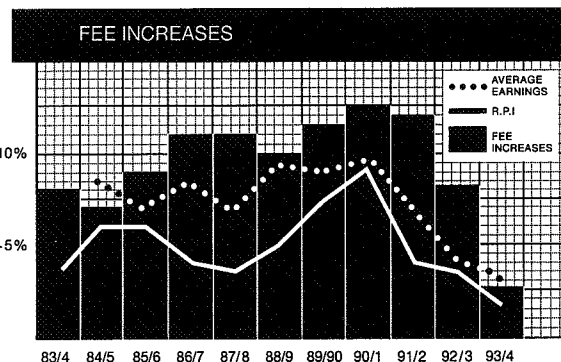
The age profile in Table 3, page 10 shows where numbers have grown or fallen in ISIS schools between 1993 and 1994. Demand remains strong for nursery or 'pre-prep' places for the rising-fives, with increases of 12.0 per cent and 8.5 per cent among two and three year-olds respectively and a modest rise among four-year-olds. Five and six year-olds are also up, by 1.7 and 2.7 percent. Other rises are recorded among 14, 15, 18 and 19-year-olds.

Fees decelerate

School fees increased on average in 1993-94 by 2.6 per cent, compared with 8.3 per cent in the previous year and 12.0 per cent and above in 1991-92 and 1990-91. Average termly fees are recorded in Table 4, page 11 and Table 6, page 13. The former includes a regional breakdown of pupil numbers and average termly fees for full boarders, weekly boarders, day pupils in boarding schools and day schools. The latter compares percentage increases in average day and boarding fees (under school associations) over a five-year period with increases in inflation, measured by the Retail Prices Index, average earnings (Department of Employment figures) and teachers' pay (DFE).

The past year's fee rise of 2.6 per cent is the lowest recorded for many years. It reflects continuing reductions in overall inflation and, in

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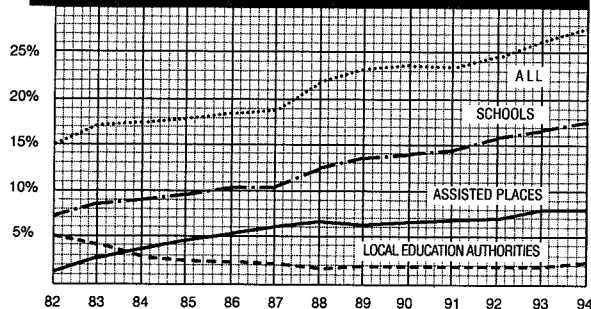
particular, teachers' pay awards. It is still ahead of the RPI, but education costs always are, in both maintained and independent sectors: they are labour and capital intensive and therefore largely reflect labour and equipment costs rather than the elements (like prices of seasonal vegetables) making up the RPI. Local education authority spending in 1993-94 is allowed by central government to rise by 2.6 per cent, which is higher than the RPI.

Graph 4 illustrates fee increases since 1983 related to the RPI and average earnings. A distortion will have occurred this year in recording day school fees. In the past day schools were asked to include the charge for lunches; they are now asked for a basic termly fee and to exclude lunches if they are an extra charge.

Teaching and non-teaching staff salaries are the largest items in every school budget. They account for up to 80 per cent of a day school's costs and up to 60 per cent in a boarding school. The average rise in earnings for the population as a whole consistently runs ahead of the RPI - it was 3.6 per cent in 1993 (provisional calendar year figure), compared with an RPI of 1.6 per cent. Teachers' salaries have also exceeded the RPI in most years. The Government pay award to teachers in April 1993 was an increase in the basic scale of 1.5 per cent; however, as most teachers receive not only the national award

but also the incremental rises provided for in national agreements, most schools faced an overall increase in their pay bill of about 6 per cent.

Parents want small teaching groups. Individual attention for their child is important. Naturally, fee rises are less welcome. But parents cannot have generously staffed schools - and updated facilities and equipment - without paying the price. The Census indicates little change in staff:pupil ratios -1:10.7 overall and 1:12.3 with the weighting for sixth-forms. (Table 2, page 9.)

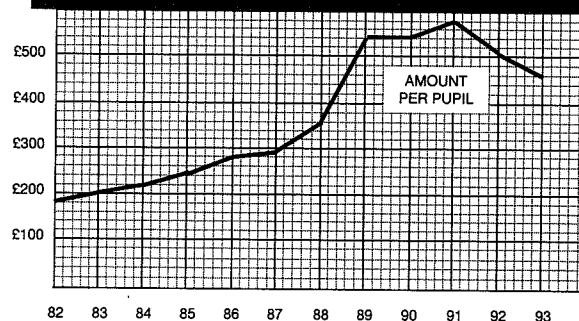
More help

Another increase in the number of children receiving help with school fees is recorded in Table 7, page 14 and Graph 5. It is up from 123,346 to 126,522, a rise of 3,176 or 2.6 per cent. More than 27 per cent of pupils in ISIS schools are now helped from various sources.

Schools are giving most of the additional help. Scholarships and bursaries account for the largest group - 81,522, or 17.6 per cent of all pupils, compared with 78,991 a year ago. Government assisted places are held by 32,207 (seven per cent of all pupils), a steadily increasing number reflecting increased take-up of the Assisted Places Scheme particularly at 11, the main age of entry, and the expansion of numbers planned by the Government for the mid-1990s. Places paid for by local

education authorities - often in cases of need for which LEA schools cannot cater - also show a further rise to 9,581. Those wholly or partly funded from other sources, such as charitable trusts, have dropped to 3,212.

Table 8, page 15 and Graph 6 record the amounts spent in total and per pupil on new and improved buildings and equipment. Unsurprisingly during a recession and its aftermath, when schools are trying to minimise fee rises, these have dropped in recent years. During 1993 schools spent £216.6 million, 9.6 per cent less than in 1992; this represented £468 per pupil, compared with £513 in the year before.

Record success abroad

Table 9, page 16 records new pupils from overseas who have joined schools since the previous Census day. Foreign pupils coming to UK boarding schools during the year (ie not the total number in our schools) showed the biggest increase ever recorded by ISIS, the more remarkable because they built on a substantial increase in the previous year. They totalled 6,422, compared with 5,859, a rise of 9.6 per cent - well over double the percentage rise in 1992-93. They more than compensate for the drop in British pupils whose parents live abroad or serve in the armed forces.

Unusually, every part of the world shows an increase with the single

exception of Australasia. The biggest increases are again from the rest of Europe and from the Far East, where *ISIS International* has concentrated its marketing of British boarding schools. Increased recruitment from Germany, Eastern Europe, Hong Kong and Taiwan in particular confirms the value of consistent *ISIS* appearances at British and international education exhibitions overseas as well as permanent local representation. Recruitment in the past year from elsewhere in Europe has increased by an unprecedented 17 per cent and from the Far East excluding Hong Kong by 10.6 per cent; even in Hong Kong, traditionally the strongest single source of overseas pupils, there was a modest growth of 1.76 per cent.

British boarding schools have a long tradition of attracting foreign and expatriate pupils. Recent increases in foreign pupils have spectacularly reversed a decline in their numbers during the 1980s. They come for high academic standards and intellectual rigour, expertise in English language teaching and unparalleled extra-curricular opportunities, all underpinned by quality pastoral care. They are assets not only to the schools but to Britain, too.

Boarding schools earn at least £150 million per year for Britain in foreign currency. Even more important are the long-term benefits to Britain of hosting, for part of their school education, thousands of young foreigners, many of whom will eventually occupy influential positions in their own countries.

Table 10, page 17 shows the rising proportion of independent school post A-level leavers going on to higher education. The table does not record post-GCSE leavers. Three of the school associations - GBGSA, GSA and ISAI - include some schools which do not have sixth-forms and therefore do not offer A-level courses. Their numbers of A-level leavers need to be read with this in mind.

Table 11, page 17 records sizes of schools - the number in membership of each association with their pupil numbers. **Table 12, page 18** shows percentages of boarders in schools belonging to the associations and **Table 13, page 18** gives boy/girl ratios.

General & association tables

All the general tables are on pages 8 to 18. Those which follow (pages 20 to 47) relate to particular associations of schools, **indicated by the**

initials at the top of each page.

Dual membership

Some schools are members of more than one association. For the sake of clarity and to avoid their statistics being counted twice, these schools are recorded in the Census under one association only. This does, however, produce distortions in the apparent size of associations.

The Society of Headmasters & Headmistresses of Independent Schools (SHMIS) appears (on page 8) as having only 51 members, whereas its full membership is 70; 19 have dual membership with the Headmasters' Conference and they are included in the HMC figures. There are 20 schools in membership of the Independent Schools Association Incorporated (ISAI) which are also in membership of other associations and do not appear in the ISAI tables.

Acknowledgements

This year every eligible school returned its Census form. I am grateful to the heads, deputy heads, bursars, secretaries and other members of staff who co-operated and to the chairmen, president and secretaries of the associations.

Julian Bewick and the Monkton Combe Computing Service devoted many hours of patient and careful work to this survey. They must be congratulated on producing a document which is widely valued by schools, researchers, educationalists, journalists, commentators and others for the detailed information it provides on the major part of the independent sector. The death of John Widdowson deprived us of a much-valued colleague whose help in completing their returns was appreciated by schools. Julian Bewick has performed this task as well this year.

NOTES ON TABLES FOR INDIVIDUAL ASSOCIATIONS

Tables on the following pages show changes that occurred between January 1993 and January 1994.

In order that fair comparisons can be made, only those schools which completed the census in BOTH years have figures included in the tables.

A few schools changed the associations to which they belong during the year between the two census days. Their figures are included in tables for their current associations.

Age ranges for schools in England, Wales and Ireland are calculated using 1st September as a base. Those in Scotland use 1st January.

Tables 14A to 20A show numbers of pupils in the schools. Current numbers are shown in normal print, with last year's figures printed below in italics. Percentage changes are printed as the third line of each group of three lines. In cases of large percentage change, it is wise to look at the figures above to see if the change is significant.

TABLES 14B to 20B show the numbers of pupils and the average fees by areas. A blank entry in a fees or numbers column indicates that there is no school of the relevant category in the area. A blank in the per cent change row means there is no significant change.

TABLES 14C, D and E to 20C, D and E deal with staffing.

TABLES 14F and G to 20F and G deal with numbers and courses of study of sixth form pupils.

TABLES 14H, I and J to 20H, I and J show the sources of entry and destinations of leavers. Proportions shown in each category are believed to be accurate, but total numbers are higher than those shown. These tables are amongst the most difficult for schools to complete accurately as sources and destinations are not always known.
