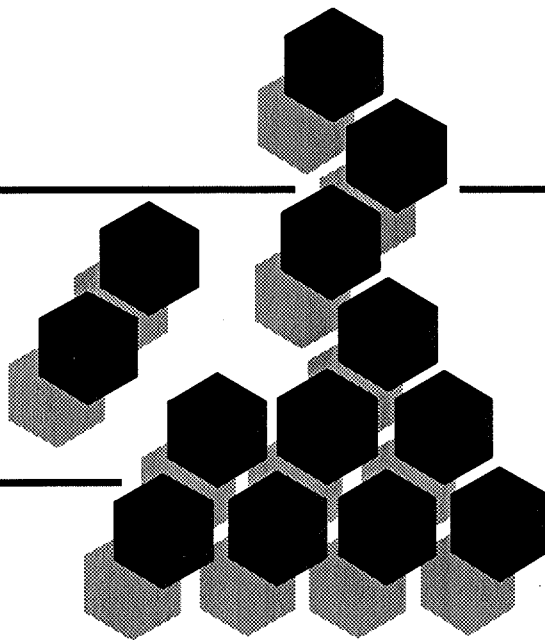

- SHMIS - schools whose heads are members of the Society of Headmasters & Headmistresses of Independent Schools and whose governing bodies are members of GBA
- GBA - boys' and coeducational schools whose governing bodies are members of the Governing Bodies Association
- GSA - girls' schools whose heads are members of the Girls' Schools Association and whose governing bodies belong to GBGSA
- GBGSA - girls' schools whose governing bodies are members of the Governing Bodies of Girls' Schools Association
- IAPS - schools whose heads are members of the Incorporated Association of Preparatory Schools
- ISA - schools whose heads are members of the Independent Schools Association

The information relates to January 1998, except that expenditure on buildings and equipment is for the financial year ending at various dates in 1997.

ISIS CENSUS 1998 INTRODUCTION

Strong growth sustained

Resurgent growth in pupil numbers is being sustained in ISIS-member schools in 1998: growth of 1.6 per cent this year mirrors last year's near-record rise.

On Census Day in January 1998, ISIS schools were educating 476,860 boys and girls, compared with 469,439 a year earlier. This is a net increase of 7,421 pupils, the third largest percentage increase since the ISIS Census was first produced in its present form sixteen years ago, exceeded only in 1987 and, very slightly, last year.

Another substantial increase in the number of day boys and girls, compared with a slightly smaller drop in the number of boarders, has produced the net rise. Day pupils have increased by 9,239; boarders have fallen by 1,818.

Pupil numbers have risen across a wider than usual span of ages, drops occurring in only five of the nineteen year groups for which the schools cater. Once again, the largest percentage rise has been achieved among under-11s; there is also a significantly larger growth in the main preparatory school age range of 8-13.

The Census Details

Between pages 6 and 12 the tables summarise the main statistics and percentage changes between 1997 and 1998.

The Census was taken at 1,306 schools. All are in the United Kingdom, except for five in the Irish Republic. These schools educate 478,769 children aged up to 19, including 403,338 day boys and girls and 75,431 boarders. [Table 1, page 13]

So that we compare like with like, results from schools in the current year are compared with results from *those same schools* for the year before. The number of schools included in subsequent tables therefore differs from the number in Table 1. [Membership of the school associations which constitute ISIS (listed on the inside cover) also changes: some schools join during the year and a few merge, close or leave.]

The 1998 comparisons, therefore, are between the 1,292 schools which participated in this Census and the 1997 survey. In these schools there are 476,860 pupils in 1998 (the figure printed in bold in the top line of the comparative table), compared with 469,439 in 1997 (the figure immediately below), giving the net increase of 7,421 or 1.6 per cent. [Table 2, page 13]

Table 2, differentiating between day and boarding boys and girls in the seven associations of schools, shows a rise of 2.36 per cent in day pupils overall (boys up by 1.92 per cent, girls by 2.81 per cent). Among all pupils (after taking account of boarders) the increases are 1.04 per cent for boys and 2.19 for girls.

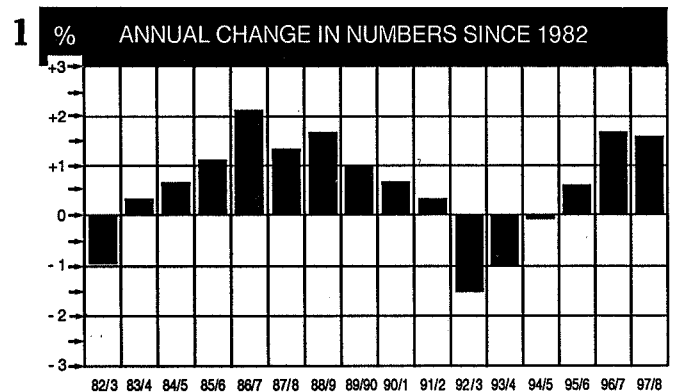
Boarding figures show an overall drop of 2.36 per cent: 2.78 per cent among boys, 1.71 per cent among girls. These compare with 2.4, 3.4 and 0.8 per cent respectively in 1997,

and greater reductions in previous years. This stabilisation in the boarding trend has occurred despite a reduction in the number of new foreign pupils [see below]. (Boarding numbers include full and weekly boarders.)

The same page records a further improvement in staff:pupil ratios, to 1:10.6 across all schools and 1:12.3 weighted for sixth-forms.

Table 3A on page 14, which was introduced last year, indicates the increasingly flexible use of schools' boarding facilities by day pupils, particularly in preparatory schools. Schools are asked to record day pupils who board for one night or more: 12,962 day boys and girls spent 103,846 nights in school during the year - an average of more than eight nights each. Both figures represent a sharp increase on 1997.

ISIS-member schools represent about 80 per cent of the UK's independently-educated pupils. Graph 1 traces overall changes in pupil numbers over the sixteen ISIS surveys produced on the present comparative basis. Numbers fell in the first two years (affected by the recession of the early 1980s). Between 1984 and 1991 there were eight years of continuous growth. In 1992-95, following the severe recession of the early 1990s, we recorded falling numbers, albeit by small percentages and despite generally buoyant day pupil recruitment. Since 1995 there have been three years of strong growth.



ISIS statistics reflect trends among the 2,400 schools which educate more than 590,000 pupils in the UK independent sector as a whole. However, the proportion of pupils who are boarders in ISIS schools (16 per cent) is slightly higher, whereas new day schools are under-represented. The latter take time to become sufficiently established to gain

accreditation and admission to the heads' and governors' associations constituting the Independent Schools Council, of which National ISIS is a part. The Census records the continuing growth in the representation of girls, who now constitute 47.4 per cent of pupils.

But how do independent school trends compare with those in the maintained sector? State school rolls have been rising for seven years, after a long period of declining numbers arising from demographic factors in the 1970s and 1980s. Department for Education & Employment (DfEE) statistics show that maintained schools rolls in England increased overall by 0.9 per cent in 1996-97 (the most recent available). [Under-fives rose by 0.8 per cent; 5-10 year-olds by 1.0 per cent; 11-15 year-olds by 1.0 per cent. Over-16s attending sixth-form colleges are included in further education, not school, statistics.]

Table 3, page 14 records the ages at which pupils numbers have risen or fallen in ISIS schools between 1997 and 1998. Numbers of nursery or kindergarten age children have again grown strongly, with a cumulative rise of 4.9 per cent among those up to 4 years old. In the 5 to 10 age group the cumulative growth is 3.8 per cent, slightly more than in the previous year. The growth among the traditional preparatory school age range (8-13) is also slightly greater at 2.0 per cent. Among 11-15 year olds there is a smaller cumulative reduction (of only 0.3 per cent) than in the previous year. At the top of the age range there is a cumulative increase among 16-19 year-olds of 0.4 per cent.

Fees and Costs

Fee increases in 1997-98 averaged 5.2 per cent which is the same as in the previous year. Average rises (across all types of school) were 4.8 per cent in 1995-96, 4.2 per cent in 1994-95, 2.6 per cent in 1993-94, 8.3 per cent in 1992-93 and substantially higher before that; increases averaged about 10 per cent per annum in the 1980s.

Average termly fees are recorded in **Tables 4 & 5, page 15**. The former includes a regional breakdown of pupil numbers and average termly fees for full and weekly boarders and for day pupils in day and boarding schools. **Table 5** compares percentage increase in average day and boarding fees (under school associations) over a five year period with increases in inflation, measured by the Retail Prices Index (RPI), average earnings and teachers' pay (DfEE figures).

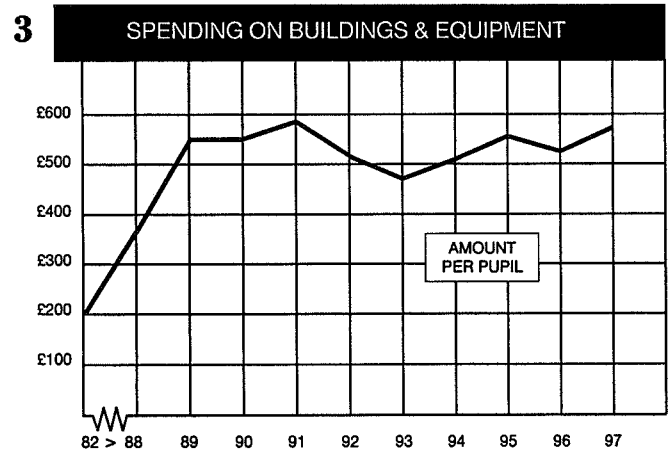
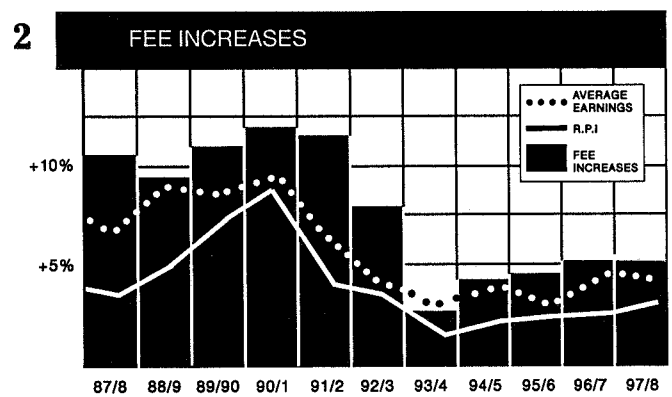
The RPI is an inadequate guide so far as education costs are concerned. Labour and capital costs affect schools far more than the elements used to calculate RPI. Independent school fees must also cover administration, maintenance and capital expenditure as well as tuition - items which are often overlooked when facile comparisons are made between per capita spending in the independent and maintained sectors. Independent school costs, and therefore fees, are also more visible than those in schools funded by taxes.

Schools have little control over the increased staff costs which chiefly determine their annual fee rises. This is because most schools pay teachers' national awards or more, plus national incremental scales. Salaries of teachers and other staff are the largest items of school expenditure, accounting for up to 80 per cent of a typical day school's

costs and around 60 per cent in a boarding school. The Government pay award to teachers in 1997 was a phased increase on the basic scale of 3.3 per cent. As most teachers received not only this award but also incremental rises provided for in national agreements, many schools had an overall increase in their pay bill of five per cent or more.

Parents regard smaller teaching groups as one of the principal distinguishing features of independent schools compared with other types of school. This is particularly the case in schools with boarding pupils. Fees are the price parents pay for generously staffed schools as well updated facilities. This Census records a further strengthening in staff:pupil ratios (see above and **Table 2 page 13**).

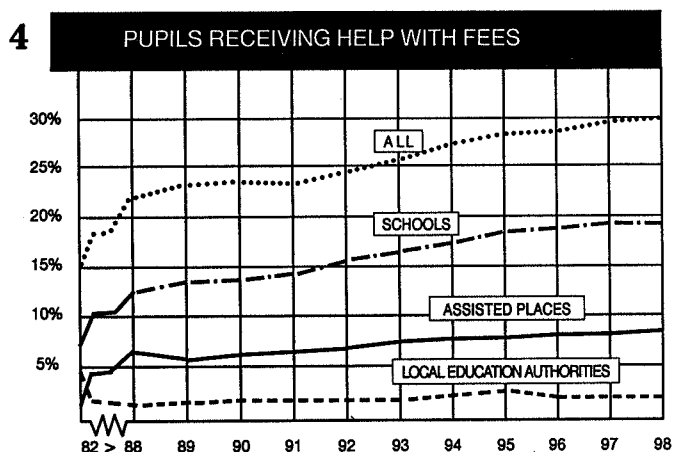
Graph 2 illustrates fee rises since 1987-88 and relates them to the RPI and average earnings over the same period. Teachers' salaries have often outpaced the RPI through national awards alone, without taking incremental rises into account. Only national awards are included in teachers' percentage increases in **Table 5**.



Spending in total and per pupil on new and improved buildings and equipment is recorded in **Table 8, page 17** and **Graph 3**. During 1997 schools spent £272.7 million, or £571 per pupil (compared with £247.1 million and £526 respectively in 1996). These are among the largest amounts and highest percentage increases recorded. Total spending increased by 10.3 per cent, spending per pupil by 8.6 per cent. While expenditure on new buildings rose substantially, spending on improvements to buildings and equipment increased even more - by 20.7 per cent in total and 19 per cent per pupil. Such figures are signs of schools' confidence in the future.

More Help for Pupils

More families are being helped with school fees. The number of children receiving help from various sources is now 143,020, an increase of 2.7 per cent. They represent 30.0 per cent of all pupils in ISIS schools. Details are given in Table 7, page 17 and Graph 4.



Schools themselves give most help. Their scholarships and bursaries support 88,394 pupils (18.5 per cent of all pupils), a similar proportion to last year.

Government assisted places are held by 40,331 (8.5 per cent of all pupils). The rise in their number reflects the expansion of the Assisted Places Scheme, to include pupils below the age of 11 and more schools, by the Conservative Government from 1996. The Labour Government elected last year is phasing out the scheme, with the result that new assisted place pupils who entered schools in September 1997 are the last intake under the government-funded scheme.

Places paid for by local education authorities and from other sources (such as charitable trusts) rose to 3,135 and 4,987 respectively. The increase in help 'from other sources' includes assistance through nursery voucher schemes and the successor scheme. (It is likely that nursery voucher numbers represent an underestimate.) In this table Northern Ireland (where funding arrangements differ) is now shown separately.

Overseas Recruitment

Table 9 on page 18 records *new pupils* from overseas who have joined schools since the previous Census day in 1997. This is not, therefore, the total number of overseas pupils in our schools (which is probably more than 18,000).

Foreign pupils who arrived during the year totalled 7,604, compared with 8,015 in the previous year. This is a drop of 5.1 per cent and the first to be recorded for some years. During the 1990s there has been a strong growth in the recruitment of foreign pupils, typically of between 8-10 per cent per year.

The change this year is mainly a reflection of the financial turmoil in the East Asian economies, which has halved the value of some currencies and therefore affected the ability of families to afford to send their children to schools and universities in the UK and elsewhere. Until this happened in Korea, Thailand, Japan, Malaysia, Taiwan and Indonesia, for example, the number of children coming from those countries to British independent schools was increasing by up to 20 per cent per year. Hong Kong also returned to Chinese rule during the period covered by this Census; the number of children from Hong Kong began to decline in 1996, after substantial increases in previous years.

East Asia still accounts for 41.8 per cent of new foreign pupils. Their origins are separately recorded for Hong Kong, Taiwan and the remainder of the Far East. Intense interest in UK schools and universities shown by the Chinese at British education exhibitions in Beijing (where there were 30,000 visitors) and Hong Kong in January 1998 indicates that the People's Republic alone represents a future market of huge potential.

Continental Europe, however, currently provides the most significant area of growth: mainland Europeans, from Spain to Russia, constitute 32.2 per cent of new foreign pupils and have increased by 2.6 per cent. Germany is one of the most important sources of these pupils. Recruitment is boosted by ISIS International's regular attendance at education exhibitions in Germany, by permanent and active representation there throughout the year and by the co-operation of British Council offices, which now extends to Austria.

The high academic reputation of our schools, their expertise in English language teaching, the breadth of the boarding experience, good discipline and the prospect of top A-level grades for entry to well-regarded British universities are among the factors which attract overseas pupils.

A survey of more than 1,700 foreign pupils who left 200 ISIS-member schools after taking A-levels in 1997 showed that 66 per cent of them stayed to undertake degree courses at UK universities; 21 per cent went to universities in their home countries or elsewhere.

The benefits to Britain of strong links with new generations of well-educated foreigners who will occupy influential positions in their own countries are inestimable. The value of their fees to the British economy can be estimated, at about £161 million (Table 9A, page 18).

After three years of growth, the number of British expatriate children has declined by 17.5 per cent. As in previous years, the number of children serving overseas in the British

armed forces has also fallen as a consequence of personnel cutbacks and changes in the operation of the Ministry of Defence boarding school allowance. Reduced numbers of service boarders accounted for 35 per cent of the decline in total boarding numbers between the late 1980s and mid-1990s.

Leavers after A-levels

Table 10, page 19 shows the high proportion (90 per cent) of independent school leavers going on to higher education - usually university - after taking A-levels or other sixth-form qualifications. It does not record those who leave immediately after GCSE. Three associations - GBGSA, GSA and ISA - include some schools which do not have sixth-forms and therefore do not offer A-level courses: their statistics reflect that fact. The table probably understates higher education entrants because schools may lose touch with some leavers who defer university entry.

Size; Boarding/Day; Boys/Girls

Table 11, page 19 records sizes of schools. Each figure under the associations represents the number of schools whose pupil rolls are within the stated range. The average size of an ISIS school is 367. See Graph 5.

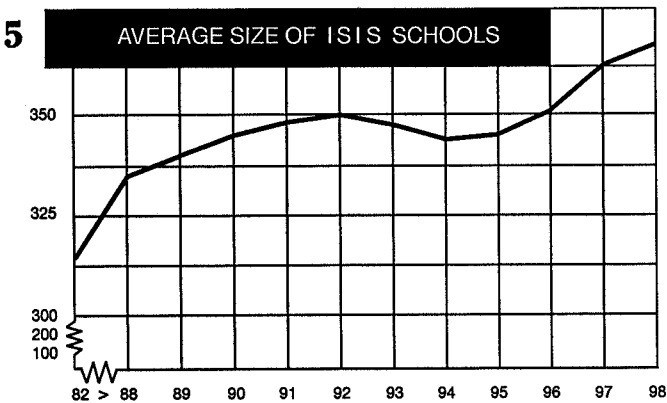


Table 12, page 20 shows percentages of boarders: for example, there are 26 schools across all associations with 95 per cent or more boarders.

Table 13, page 20 gives boy/girl ratios. For example, there are 166 all-boy schools and 212 all-girl schools; the others are mixed in varying proportions.

General & Association Tables

All the general tables are on pages 13 to 20. Those which follow (pages 22 to 35) relate to separate associations of schools. Please refer to the initials at the top of each page.

Multiple Membership

Some schools belong to more than one association. In the general tables on pages 13 to 20, each school is recorded under one association only. This avoids counting the same school and its pupils more than once, but produces distortions in the apparent size of associations.

The Society of Headmasters & Headmistresses of Independent Schools (SHMIS) appears to have only 55 members. Its full membership is 77 but some schools are also members of other associations (chiefly HMC) and they have their figures recorded under these associations in the general tables. There are 22 schools in the Independent Schools Association (ISA) which also belong to other associations and do not appear under ISA in general tables.

Governing bodies of schools whose heads are in HMC, GSA or SHMIS belong to either GBA or GBGSA. But there are a few schools in the governing bodies' associations whose heads are not members of an association of heads: these appear in the general tables separately under GBA or GBGSA.

In association tables (on pages 22 to 35), ALL schools in SHMIS, GBA, GBGSA and ISA are included in the tables for those associations, i.e. not just the schools which belong to only one association of heads or governors. These four associations are the ones mainly affected by multiple membership. In this way their strength is fully represented.

Acknowledgements

This year all but one of the 1,307 eligible schools returned their Census forms. We are grateful to the heads, deputy heads, bursars, secretaries and other members of staff who co-operated.

Julian Bewick and the Monkton Combe Computing Service devoted many hours of patient and careful work to this survey. They must be congratulated on producing a document which is greatly valued by schools researchers, educationalists, journalists and others for the detailed information it provides on the major part of the independent sector.

TOTAL NUMBER IN CENSUS 1998 (see Table 1, page 13)

Schools in Census: All but one of the 1,307 ISIS-member schools are included in the 1998 survey, taken on Census Day 15 January. ISIS schools are those in membership of the associations of governors, heads and bursars which represent the majority of UK independent schools. The 478,769 pupils recorded in them in January 1998 account for about 80% of the total numbers of pupils in independent schools in the UK (which is more than 590,000).

Day/Boarding: The Census shows that 84.2% of ISIS school pupils are day boys and girls, 15.8% are boarders. The boarding proportion has been declining steadily for many years: in 1982, for example, 27.7% of pupils were boarders, in 1989 23.4%. Full and weekly boarders are counted together. Occasional boarding by day pupils is recorded separately in **Table 3A on page 14**: 12,962 day pupils spent 103,846 nights in school during the year.

Boys/Girls: 52.6% of pupils are boys, 47.4% girls. The proportion of girls has increased since the ISIS Census was established on its present comparative basis in 1982, when they represented only 41.7% of the total.

Tables 2-9 compare 1,292 ISIS schools which were included in the 1997 and 1998 surveys. In **Tables 2 and 3 on pages 13/14**, for example, the 1998 figures are shown in bold type, with 1997 figures below and the percentage changes in italics.

The increase in the total number of pupils is one of the largest since the ISIS Census was first produced in its present form 16 years ago (exceeded only in 1987 and 1997). The number of day pupils has increased by 9,239 and the number of boarders has dropped by 1,818, giving a net increase of 7,421 (1.6 per cent).

Previous years' figures were: 1997: +1.7% (net gain of 7,640 pupils); 1996: +0.6% (net gain 2,877); 1995: -0.1% (net loss 509); 1994: -1.0% (net loss 4,476); 1993: -1.5% (net loss 6,973); 1992: -0.2% (net loss 1,065); 1991: +0.7% (net gain 3,079); 1990: +1.0% (net gain 4,638).

The rise in day pupil numbers this year mirrors last year's strong growth and the decrease among boarders is the second smallest recorded.

This table indicates the change in size of each year group since 1997, with cumulative figures for the main educational stages.

Strong growth continues in the nursery sector, with a cumulative increase of 4.9% among 2-4 year-olds. In the 5-10 age group the cumulative rise is 3.8%. There is an increase of 2.0% in the main preparatory age range of 8-13. The 11-15 cohort shows a steadily declining cumulative reduction of 0.3%. Among 16-19 year-olds there is a cumulative increase of 0.4%.

Increased pupil numbers are more widely and evenly spread than in recent years, only five out of the 19 age groups recording a decrease.

The average rise in fees was 5.2% which is the same as in the previous year.

Note that the averages above are for schools of various types across the full age range. Averages for day and boarding within particular types of school, including junior/preparatory or senior, are more clearly differentiated in Table 5. Note also the differences between day fees in entirely day schools and the higher day fees in schools with a mixture of day and boarding pupils; schools of the latter type will usually have a longer school day and week.

The most relevant comparison of fee increases is with teachers' pay awards and incremental rises. Fees chiefly reflect:

- * generous staffing (this Census shows a further improvement in staff:pupil ratios)
- * rising salaries and wages of teaching and non-teaching staff, over which schools have little or no control, as most pay at least the nationally-agreed awards and incremental scales. Teachers' incremental rises add substantial amounts to schools' salary bills;
- * investment in buildings and equipment, as well as the rising costs of goods and services bought by schools.

The increasing number of pupils receiving help with their fees has been a long-term trend; it accelerated during the early 1990s' recession as more families needed bursaries from schools to enable children at crucial examination stages to complete their courses. The increase of 2.7% this year brings the proportion of children receiving help from various sources to 30.0%. (In 1982 the proportion was only 15.8%.) School bursaries and scholarships now help 18.5% of all pupils.

The rise in the number of assisted places reflects the expansion of the Assisted Places Scheme by the Conservative Government to include pupils below the age of 11 and more schools. Assisted Places now account for 8.5% of all pupils. This Census includes the final intake of new pupils under the government-funded scheme, who entered their schools in September 1997. The Labour Government is phasing out the scheme.

During 1997 schools spent £272.7 million on new buildings and improvements to buildings and equipment, 10.4% more than in 1996. This was equivalent to £571 per pupil, 8.7% more than in the previous year. These figures represent one of the highest levels of investment in the fabric of schools ever recorded.

After several years in which the recruitment of new foreign pupils has shown increases of between 8-10% per annum, this Census shows a reduction of 5.1%. The drop is largely accounted for by East Asia, where financial turmoil has halved the value of some currencies and therefore effectively doubled the cost of fees at schools and universities in the UK and elsewhere. East Asia still accounts, however, for more than 41% of foreign pupils.

Continental Europeans represent a rising proportion of foreign pupils: the increase in their number brings the proportion from mainland Europe to 32.2%. Germans are one of the largest national groups.

The table above records the number of new foreign pupils from the continents, regions or countries indicated, the proportion which each represents of the total of foreign pupils, and the percentage change since 1997. The total number of foreign pupils in ISIS schools is probably 18,000-plus. Their fees are estimated to be worth more than £161 million to Britain.

After three years in which the number of British expatriate children has risen, this group shows a 17.5% drop. The decreasing number of children from forces families is a long-term trend and, since the late 1980s, has accounted for a large part of the decline in total boarding numbers.

NOTES ON TABLES FOR INDIVIDUAL ASSOCIATIONS

Tables on the following pages show changes that occurred between January 1997 and January 1998.

In order that fair comparisons can be made, only those schools which completed the census in BOTH years have figures included in the tables.

INTRODUCED IN 1997 - Figures given in the following tables are for ALL the schools in each association. Some schools belong to more than one association (eg all HMC schools are also in GBA).

GSA figures include pupils from one school which is also a member of HMC.

HMC figures include pupils from one school which is also a member of GSA.

IAPS figures include pupils from some all-age schools whose Junior School Heads are members of IAPS.

A few schools changed the associations to which they belong during the year between the two census days. Their figures are included in tables for their current associations.

Age ranges for schools in England, Wales and Ireland are calculated using 1st September as a base. Those in Scotland use 1st January.

Tables 14A to 20A show numbers of pupils in the schools. Current numbers are shown in normal print, with last year's figures printed below in italics. Percentage changes are printed as the third line of each group of three lines. In cases of large percentage change, it is wise to look at the figures above to see if the change is significant.

TABLES 14B to 20B show the numbers of pupils and the average fees by areas. A blank entry in a fees or numbers column indicates that there is no school of the relevant category in the area. A blank in the per cent change row means there is no significant change.

TABLES 14C, D and E to 20C, D and E deal with staffing.

TABLES 14F and G to 20F and G deal with numbers and courses of study of sixth form pupils.

TABLES 14H, I and J to 20H, I and J show the sources of entry and destinations of leavers. Proportions shown in each category are believed to be accurate, but total numbers are higher than those shown. These tables are amongst the most difficult for schools to complete accurately as sources and destinations are not always known.

INTRODUCED IN 1997

TABLES 14K to 20K deal with occasional boarding by day pupils. The left column shows the number of pupils at each age group (ages 0 - 4, 5 - 7, 8 - 11/13, 11/13 - 15, 16+) and the right hand column shows the total number of nights spent boarding during the year.

TABLES 14L to 20L show the number of member schools, and the number of schools which completed the census last year and this year. The left hand column shows numbers for schools whose only membership is of the association; the right hand column includes all schools which are members of the association.

TABLES 15M to 20M show the number of pupils whose fees are paid from overseas sources and the total **TERMLY** fee paid for the January term 1998.
