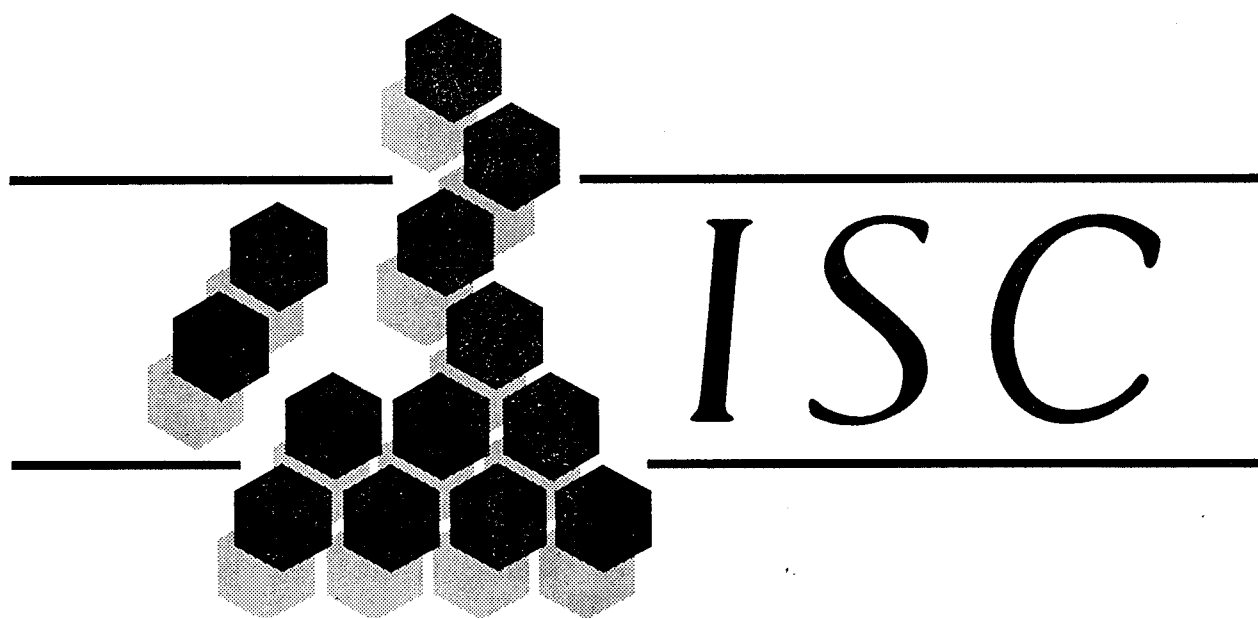

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# ISIS CENSUS 1999 INTRODUCTION

## ***Growth despite the loss of APs***

This year's ISIS Census has been awaited with particular interest. It is the first in the 17 years of the survey to cover a period when there has been no intake of children on the government Assisted Places Scheme. Since each annual intake in recent years has involved about 7,000 pupils, it was possible that there would be no overall growth in pupil numbers this year in ISC-member schools.

**In fact, pupil numbers have increased for the fourth year in succession, albeit by a smaller percentage (0.7%) than in the previous two years. Numbers have risen in twelve of the past seventeen years.**

## ***Census details***

Between pages 6 and 12 the tables and brief commentaries summarise the main statistics and percentage changes between 1998 and 1999. These are based on returns from the 1,295 schools in which the Census was taken.

The total number of schools belonging to associations within the Independent Schools Council (ISC) is 1,296; all are in the United Kingdom except for five in the Irish Republic. (The Council consists of the leading associations of governors, heads and bursars [described on the inside front cover]. National ISIS is its information, media and public relations arm.)

The total population of pupils aged up to 19 in these schools in January 1999 was 481,321, including 409,367 day boys and girls and 71,954 boarders. **[Table 1, page 13]**

However, in order to compare like with like, results from schools in the current year are compared with results from those same schools for 1998. That is why the number of schools included in Table 1 differs from the number in the subsequent, comparative tables.

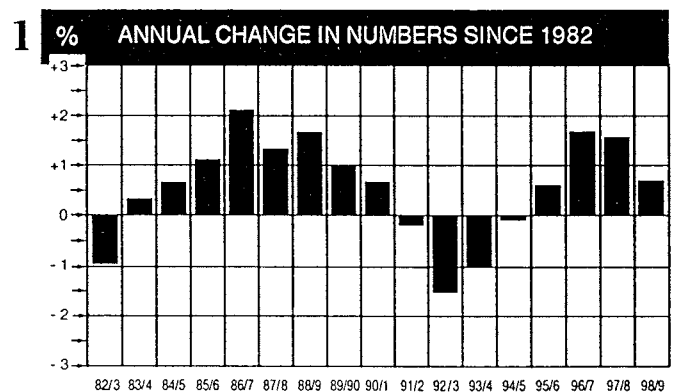
The 1999 comparisons, therefore, are between the 1,284 schools which participated in this Census and the 1998 survey. In this slightly smaller number of schools there are 478,683 pupils in 1999 (the figure printed in bold in the top line of the comparative table), whereas there were 475,285 in 1998 (the figure immediately below), giving the net increase of 3,398 or 0.7 per cent **[Table 2, page 13]**.

**Table 2**, differentiating between day and boarding boys and girls in seven of the associations, shows a rise of 1.7 per cent in day pupils (boys up by 1.1 per cent, girls up by 2.3 per cent). Among all pupils (after taking account of boarders) the changes are: boys down by less than 0.1 per cent, girls up by 1.5 per cent. The overall drop in the number of boys arises because the reduction in boarding boys is just greater than the increase in day boys. Conversely, the rise in day girls outnumbers the fall in girl boarders.

The same page records a further improvement in staff:pupil

ratios, to 1:10.7 across all schools and 1:12.4 weighted for sixth-forms.

Schools in ISC associations educate about 80 per cent of the UK's independently-educated pupils. **Graph 1** traces changes in overall pupil numbers in the seventeen ISIS surveys produced on the present comparative basis. Numbers fell at the beginning of that period, affected by the recession of the early 1980s. Between 1984 and 1991 there were eight years of continuous, and at times spectacular, growth. In 1992-95, following the early 1990s' recession, we recorded falling numbers albeit by small percentages and despite generally buoyant day pupil recruitment. Since 1995 growth has resumed: by 0.6%, 1.7%, 1.6% and 0.7% in successive years.



ISIS statistics reflect trends among the total of 2,400 schools educating almost 600,000 pupils in the whole UK independent sector. However, the proportion of pupils who are boarders in ISC schools (15 per cent) is slightly higher, whereas new day schools are under-represented. The latter take time to become sufficiently established to gain accreditation and admission to the governors' and heads' associations constituting ISC.

ISIS figures also need to be seen in relation to trends in the maintained sector and, therefore, among children of school age nationally. State school rolls have been rising for eight years, after a long period of declining numbers arising from demographic factors in the 1970s and 1980s. Department for Education & Employment (DfEE) statistics show that maintained school rolls in England increased overall by 0.8 per cent in 1997-98 (the most recent available). [Under-fives rose by 0.7 per cent; 5-10 year-olds by 0.7 per cent; 11-15 year-olds by 1.0 per cent. Over-16s attending sixth-form colleges are included in government further education, not school, statistics.]

**Table 3, page 14** records the ages at which pupil numbers have risen or fallen in ISC schools between 1998 and 1999. Numbers of nursery or kindergarten age children have continued their strong growth, with a cumulative rise of 5.2 per cent among those up to 4 years old. In the 5-10 age group the cumulative growth is 2.6 per cent. Growth in the traditional preparatory school age range (8-13) is 1.4 per cent. Among 11-15 year-olds the cumulative reduction (of

0.3 per cent) is similar to the previous year. At the top of the age range there is a cumulative drop among 16-19 year-olds of 2.7 per cent, compared with a modest rise last year.

Senior schools are chiefly affected by the absence of a 1998 intake of government assisted place pupils. A separate analysis of all the schools with assisted places (including those in Scotland) shows that the total number of assisted pupils dropped from 40,237 last year to 32,450 - a reduction of 7,787 - as one full cohort of students left and was not replaced by a new intake. The *total* number of pupils in those schools, however, fell by much less, from 303,223 to 301,305 - a reduction of 1,918, or 0.6 per cent. The total number of *new* pupils in those schools also fell by much less, from 59,328 to 55,717 - a reduction of 3,611.

Although this is the first year in which the effects of the loss of assisted places has been felt, three initial conclusions can be drawn. One is that the schools are proving very resilient in the face of this major change. The second is that the schools are themselves providing financial help to many more pupils - nearly 4,500 *more* pupils in these schools alone are being helped by the schools, an increase of 7.8 per cent.

The third is more disturbing. There is already a measurable shift in the intake to AP schools, away from pupils coming from maintained schools. In 1997-98, recruits from maintained schools made up 34.1 per cent of all new entrants; this year that proportion has fallen to 31.3 per cent. Over time, this may well result in an unwelcome change in the overall social and economic background of pupils in those schools.

**Table 3A**, which was introduced in 1997, illustrates the increasingly flexible use of schools' boarding facilities by day pupils, particularly in preparatory schools. Most schools with boarders also have day pupils. They are asked to record day pupils who board for one night or more: 13,843 day boys and girls spent 116,088 nights in school during the year - an average of 8.4 nights each.

### Fees & costs

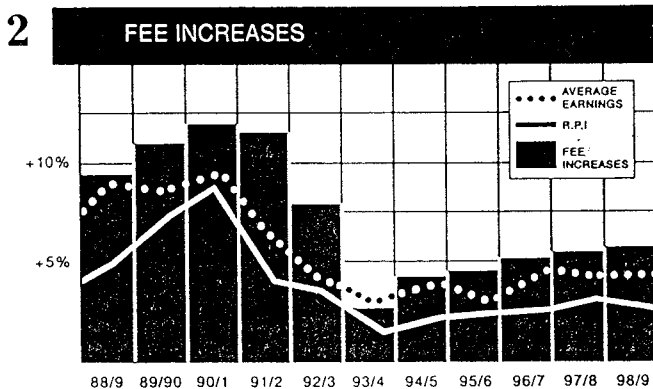
Fee increases in 1998-99 averaged 5.7 per cent, slightly more than last year. Average rises across all types of school were 5.2 per cent in 1997-98, 4.8 per cent in 1995-96, 4.2 per cent in 1994-95 and 2.6 per cent in 1993-94. In 1992-93 the increase was 8.3 per cent and substantially higher before that; during the 1980s annual increases averaged about 10 per cent.

Average termly fees are recorded in **Tables 4 & 5**, page 15. The former includes a regional breakdown of pupil numbers and average termly fees for full and weekly boarders and for day pupils in day and boarding schools. (Fees for day pupils in boarding schools are usually higher than day pupils' fees in day schools.) **Table 5** compares percentage increases in average day and boarding fees (under school associations) over a five-year period with increases in inflation, measured by the Retail Prices Index (RPI), average earnings and teachers' pay (DfEE figures). (Only national awards, not incremental payments, are included in teachers' percentage increases in this table.)

The RPI is an unreliable guide so far as education costs are concerned. Capital and labour costs affect schools far more than the elements used to calculate RPI. Independent

school fees must cover administration, maintenance and capital expenditure as well as tuition. These items are often overlooked when facile comparisons are made between per capita spending in the independent and maintained sectors. There is a gap between the two, but the difference is less than it appears to be because independent school fees pay for expensive items which are not included in the per capita figures quoted for state schools. The full costs of an independent school - represented by the fee it needs to charge - are also more visible than those of a school funded by taxes.

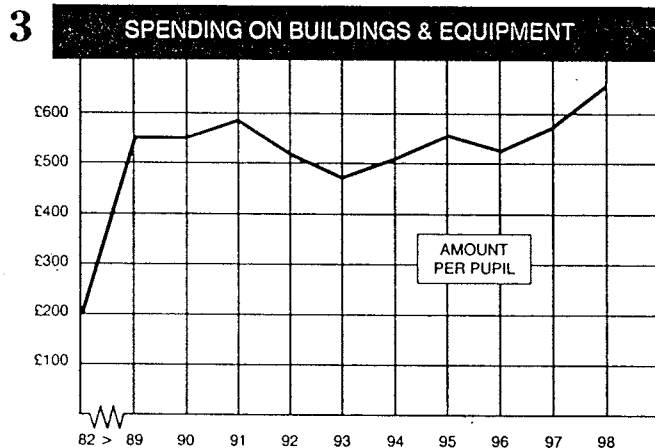
Increased staff costs chiefly determine annual fee rises. ISC schools pay teachers' national awards or more, plus incremental scales. Salaries of teachers and other staff are the largest items of school expenditure, accounting for up to 80 per cent of a typical day school's costs and around 60 per cent in a boarding school. The Government pay award to teachers in 1998 was a phased increase on the basic scale of 3.8 per cent. As most teachers received not only this award but also incremental rises provided for in national agreements, many schools had an overall increase in their pay bill of up to six per cent. Parents regard smaller teaching groups, and therefore greater individual attention for their children, as one of the principal distinguishing features of independent schools compared with other types of school. This is particularly true of those with boarding pupils. This Census records a further improvement in staff:pupil ratios (page 13). Fees are the price parents pay for generous staffing as well as updated facilities. Figures below show the record spending on new and improved facilities, also reflecting high inflation in building costs.



**Graph 2** illustrates fee rises since 1988-89 against the background of the RPI and average earnings over the same period. Historically, teachers' salaries have often outpaced or matched the RPI through national awards alone, without taking incremental rises into account.

### Investing in the future

Spending in total and per pupil on new and improved buildings and equipment is recorded in **Table 8, page 17** and **Graph 3**. During 1998 schools spent £315.0 million, or £658 per pupil (compared with £283.3 million and £596 respectively in 1997). These are among the largest increases recorded. Total spending increased by 11.3 per cent, spending per pupil by 10.4 per cent.



While expenditure on improvements to buildings and equipment increased substantially, spending on new buildings rose by a record amount: £190.1 million represents an increase of 18.2 per cent; per pupil this is £397, a rise of 17.5 per cent.

These figures indicate schools' confidence in the future by reflecting heavy investment in, for example, information and communications technology and in other curriculum areas, accommodation for younger children as schools expand their age ranges, new facilities where schools become coeducational and updated boarding accommodation.

Such high levels of investment are all the more remarkable at a time when many schools, especially those participating in the assisted places scheme, are also devoting resources to additional scholarship and bursary funds so that they can help more pupils, many of whom would have received assistance from the government scheme (see below).

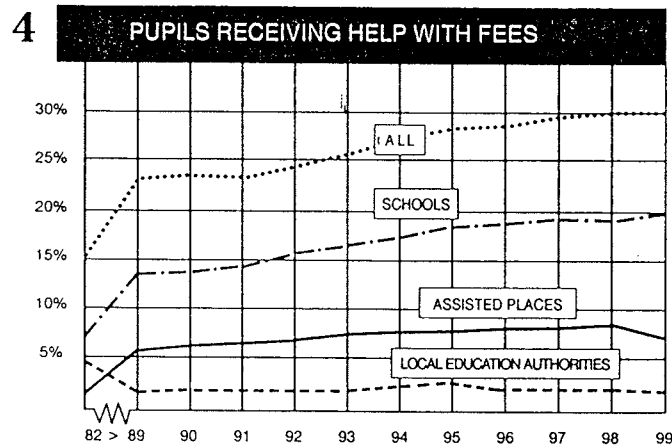
### More help for pupils

The number of families who are being helped with school fees is being maintained despite the loss of government assisted places. 143,472 children are receiving help from various sources, a slight increase of 0.4 per cent. They represent 30.0 per cent of all pupils in ISC schools.

Schools themselves give most help. Their scholarships and bursaries support 95,136 pupils, a rise of 7.5 per cent. This is a clear indication of the extent to which schools are already providing extra help to fill the gap left by the assisted places scheme (as noted above). Children helped by schools now account for 19.9 per cent of all pupils in ISC schools.

The number of government assisted place pupils has fallen by 18.3 per cent to 32,876 (6.9 per cent of all pupils), reflecting the first year in which there has not been a new intake of pupils under the scheme.

Places paid for by local education authorities and from other sources (such as charitable trusts) rose to 2,992 and 6,228 respectively. Details are given in **Table 7, page 17** and **Graph 4**.



### Overseas recruitment rallies

**Table 9 on page 18** records *new pupils* from overseas who have joined schools since the previous Census day in 1998. This is not, therefore, the total number of overseas pupils in our schools.

*Foreign* pupils who arrived during the year totalled 7,460, compared with 7,568 in the previous year. This is a drop of 1.4 per cent, compared with 5.1 per cent last year (which was the first reduction in this decade). During the mid-1990s there was strong growth in the recruitment of foreign pupils, typically of between 8-10 per cent per year.

This year's figures show the continuing effects of financial and economic turmoil in *East Asia*, although less marked than a year ago. The number of Hong Kong Chinese pupils has recovered after three years of decline. This is consistent with the renewed intense interest in British school education evident at another successful British Council exhibition there in January 1999; attendance in general and on the ISIS stand in particular was reminiscent of earlier boom years. The number from Taiwan has stabilised after falling last year, but the number from the remainder of the Far East has dropped substantially. The People's Republic of China will be an increasingly important market for British independent schools, as education exhibitions in Beijing and Shanghai have demonstrated. East Asia as a whole accounts for 37.0 per cent of new foreign pupils.

*Europe* is increasing its 'market share'. Our European neighbours continue to provide the most significant and rapidly increasing rate of growth: mainland Europeans, from the Iberian peninsula to Russia, now constitute 35.4 per cent of new foreign pupils and have increased in the past year by 7.5 per cent. Germany is the single most important source of these pupils. Recruitment there and in Austria is aided by ISIS International's permanent and active representation, its presence at exhibitions and by presentations at British Council offices, whose co-operation is greatly appreciated.

British independent boarding schools remain one of the UK's greatest assets overseas. Foreign families are attracted by their high academic reputation, expertise in English language teaching, broad range of activities, good discipline, and examination results which provide entry to well-regarded British universities. So far as the last factor is concerned, ISIS research indicates that two-thirds of foreign pupils at ISC schools remain in the UK for higher education.

The benefits to Britain of strong links with new generations of well-educated foreigners who will occupy influential positions in their own countries are inestimable. The value to the British economy of the fees of overseas pupils in ISC schools can be estimated, at about £179 million (**Table 9A, page 18**).

Unusually, there has been growth in the past year in the numbers of new British *expatriate* pupils and new children of parents serving overseas in the British armed forces. The former have increased by 2.8 per cent to 1,418, the latter by 7.1 per cent to 1,409.

#### Leavers after A-levels

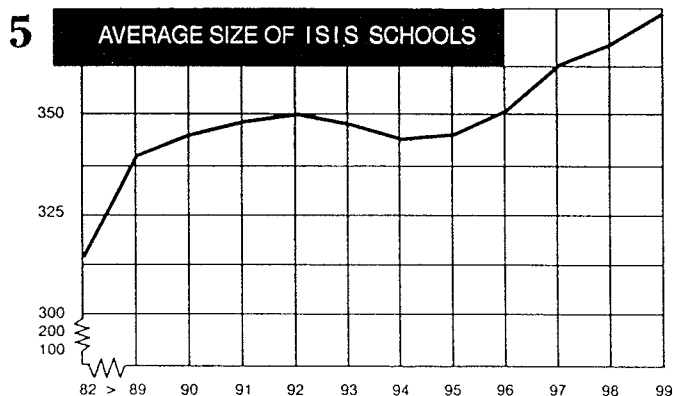
**Table 10, page 19** shows that 90 per cent of independent school-leavers proceed to higher education after taking A-levels or other sixth-form qualifications. It does not record those who leave immediately after GCSE. Three associations - GBGSA, GSA and ISA - include some schools which do not have sixth-forms: their statistics reflect that fact. The table probably understates higher education entrants because schools may lose touch with some leavers who defer university entry.

#### Size; boarding/day; boys/girls

**Table 11, page 19** records sizes of schools. Each figure under the association headings represents the number of schools whose total pupil rolls are within the stated range. The average size of an ISIS school is 373. **See Graph 5**

**Table 12, page 20** shows percentages of boarders: for example, there are 41 schools across all associations with 90 per cent or more boarders.

**Table 13, page 20** gives boy/girl ratios. For example, there



are 154 all-boy schools and 210 all-girl schools; the others are mixed in varying proportions.

#### General & association tables

All the general tables are on pages 13 to 20. Those which follow (pages 22 to 35) relate to separate associations of

schools. **Please refer to the initials at the top of each page.**

#### Multiple membership

Every ISC school must belong to at least one of its constituent associations. Many schools belong to more than one. In the general tables on pages 13 to 20, each school is recorded under one association only. This avoids counting the same school and its pupils more than once, but produces distortions in the apparent size of associations.

For example, the Society of Headmasters and Headmistresses of Independent Schools (SHMIS) appears to have only 57 members. Its full membership on Census day was 84, but some of its heads are also members of other associations (chiefly HMC) and their schools' statistics are recorded under these associations in the general tables. Similarly, there are 21 schools in the Independent Schools Association (ISA) which also belong to other associations and do not appear under ISA in the general tables.

Governing bodies of schools whose heads are members of HMC, GSA or SHMIS belong to either GBA or GBGSA. The small number of schools in the governors' associations whose heads do not belong to an association of heads appear in the general tables separately under GBA or GBGSA. (The heads of these schools are, however, in the process of applying for membership of one of the associations of heads.)

**In association tables (on pages 22 to 35), ALL schools in SHMIS, GBA, GBGSA and ISA are included in the statistics for those associations.** In this way their strength is fully represented. These four associations are the ones mainly affected by multiple membership.

#### Acknowledgements

**Schools in Census:** 1,295 ISC-member schools are included in the 1999 survey, taken on Census Day 14 January. ISC schools are those in membership of the associations of governors, heads and bursars which represent the majority of UK independent schools. The 481,321 pupils recorded in them in January 1999 account for about 80% of the total numbers of pupils in independent schools in the UK (which is almost 600,000).

**Day/Boarding:** The Census shows that 85.1% of ISC school pupils are day boys and girls, 14.9% are boarders. The boarding proportion has been declining steadily for most of the post-war period: in 1982, for example, 27.7% of pupils were boarders, in 1989 23.4%. Full and weekly boarders are counted together. Occasional boarding by day pupils is recorded separately in Table 3A on page 14: 13,869 day pupils spent 116,800 nights in school during the year (an average of 8.4 each).

**Boys/Girls:** 52.2% of pupils are boys, 47.8% girls. The proportion of girls has increased each year since the ISIS Census was established on its present comparative basis in 1982, when they represented only 41.7% of the total.

## CHANGES SINCE 1998 (see Table 2)

**Tables 2-9** compare 1,284 ISC schools which were included in the 1998 and 1999 surveys. In Tables 2 & 3 on pages 13/14, for example, the 1999 figures are shown in bold type, with 1998 figures below and the percentage changes in italics.

The increase in the total number of pupils is the fourth in succession. The number of day pupils has increased by 6,638 and the number of boarders has dropped by 3,240, giving a net increase of 3,398 (0.7 per cent).

Numbers have risen in 12 of the 17 years of the ISIS Census in its present form. Previous year's figures during this decade were: 1998 +1.6% (net gain of 7,421 pupils); 1997 +1.7% (net gain 7,640); 1996 +0.6% (net gain 2,877); 1995 -0.1% (net loss 509); 1994 -1.0% (net loss 4,476); 1993 -1.5% (net loss 6,973); 1992 -0.2% (net loss 1,065); 1991 +0.7% (net gain 3,079); 1990 +1.0% (net gain 4,638).

## **AGE COHORTS (see Table 3)**

This table indicates the change in size of each year group since 1998, with cumulative figures for the main educational stages.

Strong growth continues in the nursery sector, with a cumulative increase of 5.2% among 2-4 year-olds. In the 5-10 age group the cumulative rise is 2.6%. There is an increase of 1.4% in the main preparatory age range of 8-13. The 11-15 cohort shows a slight cumulative reduction of 0.3%. Among 16-19 year-olds there is a cumulative drop of 2.7%.

There are increased pupil numbers in eleven of the eighteen age groups.

FEES (see Tables 4 & 6) The average rise in fees was 5.7%, slightly higher than the previous year.

Note that the averages above are for schools of various types across the full age range. Averages for day and boarding within particular types of school, including junior/preparatory or senior, are more clearly differentiated in Table 5. Note also the differences between day fees in entirely day schools and the higher day fees in schools with a mixture of day and boarding pupils; schools of the latter type will usually have a longer school day and week.

The most relevant comparison of fee increases is with teachers' pay awards and incremental rises. Fees chiefly reflect:

- \* generous staffing (this Census shows a further improvement in staff:pupil ratios)
- \* rising salaries and wages of teaching and non-teaching staff, over which schools have little or no control as most pay at least the nationally-agreed awards and incremental scales. Teachers' incremental rises add substantially to schools' salary bills;
- \* investment in buildings and equipment, which continues to run at high levels, as well as the rising costs of goods and services bought by schools.

**HELP WITH FEES (see Table 7)**

The increasing number of pupils receiving help with their fees has been a long-term trend; it accelerated during the early 1990s' recession as more families needed bursaries from schools to enable children at crucial examination stages to complete their courses. The increase of 0.4% this year maintains the proportion of children receiving help from various sources at 30.0%. (In 1982 the proportion was only 15.8%.)

School bursaries and scholarships now help 19.9% of all pupils, an increase of 7.5% which reflects the extent to which schools are attempting to fill the funding gap left by the phasing out of the government Assisted Places Scheme.

Local education authority support also shows an increase, as does help from 'other sources' which include charitable trusts.

**BUILDINGS & EQUIPMENT (see Table 8)**

During 1998 schools spent £190.1 million on new buildings and improvements to buildings and equipment, 18.3% more than in 1998. This was equivalent to £397 per pupil, 17.4% more than in the previous year.

These increases are among the highest levels of investment in the fabric and facilities of schools ever recorded and also reflect increased inflation in building costs.

**NEW FOREIGN & EXPATRIATE PUPILS (see Table 9)**

These are pupils who joined ISC schools between January 1998 and January 1999, not the total number of foreign and expatriate children. The Census shows a slight decrease of 1.4% in foreign pupils, only the second drop during this decade and largely accounted for by the continuing effects of financial turmoil in many of the East Asian economies. East Asia now accounts for 37.0% of new foreign pupils.

Continental Europeans represent a rising proportion of foreign pupils: the increase in their number brings the proportion from mainland Europe to 35.4%. Germans are largest single national group, but almost every country from the Iberian peninsula to Russia is represented in ISC boarding schools.

The table above records the number of new foreign pupils from the continents, regions or countries indicated, the proportion which each represents of the total of foreign pupils, and the percentage change since 1998. The total number of foreign pupils in ISC schools is in excess of 15,000. The fees of overseas pupils in ISC schools are estimated to be worth more than £179 million to the UK.

The Census also records increases in the number of British expatriate children, including those whose parents are serving in the armed services.

# NOTES ON TABLES FOR INDIVIDUAL ASSOCIATIONS

Tables on the following pages show changes that occurred between January 1998 and January 1999.

In order that fair comparisons can be made, only those schools which completed the census in BOTH years have figures included in the tables.

Figures given in the following tables are for ALL the schools in each association. Some schools belong to more than one association (eg all HMC schools are also in GBA).

GSA figures include pupils from one school which is also a member of HMC.

HMC figures include pupils from one school which is also a member of GSA.

IAPS figures include pupils from some all-age schools whose Junior School Heads are members of IAPS.

A few schools changed the associations to which they belong during the year between the two census days. Their figures are included in tables for their current associations.

Age ranges for schools in England, Wales and Ireland are calculated using 1st September as a base. Those in Scotland use 1st January.

Tables 14A to 20A show numbers of pupils in the schools. Current numbers are shown in normal print, with last year's figures printed below in italics. Percentage changes are printed as the third line of each group of three lines. In cases of large percentage change, it is wise to look at the figures above to see if the change is significant.

TABLES 14B to 20B show the numbers of pupils and the average fees by areas. A blank entry in a fees or numbers column indicates that there is no school of the relevant category in the area. A blank in the per cent change row means there is no significant change.

TABLES 14C, D and E to 20C, D and E deal with staffing.

TABLES 14F and G to 20F and G deal with numbers and courses of study of sixth form pupils.

TABLES 14H, I and J to 20H, I and J show the sources of entry and destinations of leavers. Proportions shown in each category are believed to be accurate, but total numbers are higher than those shown. These tables are amongst the most difficult for schools to complete accurately as sources and destinations are not always known.

TABLES 14K to 20K deal with occasional boarding by day pupils. The left column shows the number of pupils at each age group ( ages 0 - 4, 5 - 7, 8 - 11/13, 11/13 - 15, 16+) and the right hand column shows the total number of nights spent boarding during the year.

TABLES 14L to 20L show the number of member schools, and the number of schools which completed the census last year and this year. The left hand column shows numbers for schools whose only membership is of the association; the right hand column includes all schools which are members of the association.

TABLES 15M to 20M show the number of pupils whose fees are paid from overseas sources and the total **TERMLY** fee paid for the January term 1999.
