

### ISIS CENSUS 1997 INTRODUCTION

### Second Largest Increase in Pupil Numbers

Between January 1996 and January 1997, ISIS-member schools had the second biggest increase in pupil numbers since the ISIS Census was first produced in its present form fifteen years ago.

When the 1997 "snapshot" was taken on the January Census day, ISIS schools were educating 469,927 boys and girls compared with 462,287 a year earlier. This is a net increase of 7,640 pupils, or 1.7 per cent. Only in 1987 was there a larger rise in pupil numbers (of 9,265, or 2.2 per cent).

This year's increase has been achieved because of an almost record number of additional day pupils and the second smallest drop in the number of boarders since ISIS records began.

While the total number of day pupils has increased by 9,569, the number of boarders has reduced by only 1,929.

Increased pupil numbers are more widely and more evenly spread than usual through the 2-19 age range for which schools cater. The largest percentage rise has been achieved among the under-11s, suggesting that many of the young children who have so dramatically swelled schools' pre-preparatory departments in recent years are now coming through the main schools.

### The Details

Tables between pages 6 and 12 summarise the main statistics and percentage changes between 1996 and 1997.

The Census was taken at 1,310 schools. All are in the United Kingdom, except for five in the Irish Republic. These schools educate 473,816 children aged between two and nineteen, including 395,940 day boys and girls and 77,876 boarders. [Table 1, page 13.]

However, so that like is compared with like, results from schools in the current year are compared with results from the same schools for the year before. The number of schools included in subsequent tables therefore differs from that in Table 1. [Membership of the school associations which constitute ISIS (listed on the inside front cover) also changes: some schools join during the year and others merge, close or leave.]

The 1997 comparisons are between the 1,298 schools which participated in this and the 1996 survey. These contained 469,927 pupils in 1997 (the bold figure in the top line of the comparative table) and 462,287 in 1996 (the figure immediately below), giving the net increase of 7,640 or 1.7 per cent. [Table 2, page 13.]


The breakdown in this table - by different kinds of pupils and associations -shows a rise of 2.50 per cent in *day* pupils overall (boys up by 2.20 per cent, girls by 2.81 per cent). Among *all* pupils (after taking account of boarding) the increases are 1.09 per cent for boys and 2.30 per cent for girls.

One of the outstanding features of the 1997 Census is the significant alleviation of the decline of boarding. The

boarding figures still show an overall drop of 2.44 per cent - 3.49 per cent among boys, 0.80 per cent among girls, but this compares with 3.47, 3.96 and 3.22 per cent respectively in 1996 and steeper drops in earlier years.

**Table 3A** on **page 14** is new this year. It indicates the flexibility of schools' boarding facilities and their use by day pupils on an occasional basis. Schools were asked to record day pupils who had boarded for one night or more: 13,013 pupils spent 95,071 nights in school during the year - an average of more than one week each. [Separate recording of weekly boarders has been discontinued: they are now counted with full boarders.]

ISIS-member schools represent about 80 per cent of all independently-educated pupils. They generally reflect trends among the 2,400 schools which educate the 600,000 children in the sector as a whole. **Graph 1** traces overall changes in numbers over the fifteen ISIS surveys produced on the present comparative basis: fewer pupils in the first two years (a reflection of the recession of the early 1980s); eight years of continuous growth between 1984 and 1991; then four years in which numbers fell, albeit by small percentages (reflecting the last recession), followed by increasing numbers in 1996 and 1997.



One factor in the ISIS survey may understate the scale of the increase in numbers across the whole sector. The proportion of boarders in ISIS schools (16.4 per cent) is somewhat higher than in the independent sector as a whole and ISIS schools contain more than 85 per cent of independent sector boarders. On the other hand, new independent day schools are under-represented because they take time to become sufficiently established to gain accreditation and admission to the heads' and governors' associations constituting the Independent Schools Joint Council and National ISIS.

There is likely, therefore, to be an even bigger proportionate increase in day pupils in the rest of the independent sector than the already impressive rise recorded in the ISIS Census.

The gap between the proportion of boys and girls in ISIS-member schools continues to narrow: 52.9 per cent of their pupils are boys, 47.1 per cent girls.

The number of school age children in the *maintained sector* has been rising for the past six years, after a long period of falling school rolls in the 1970s and throughout the 1980s. Increasing or preserving independent sector market share therefore depends upon schools achieving the levels of increased recruitment recorded in this year's Census. DfEE statistics for 1995-96 (the most recent available) show that maintained sector rolls in England increased overall by 1.3 per cent. [Under-fives rose by 1.0 per cent; 5-10 year-olds by 1.8 per cent; 11-15 year-olds by 0.6 per cent. Over-16s attending sixth-form colleges are included in further education, not school, statistics.]

The age profile in **Table 3, page 14** records where numbers have risen or fallen in ISIS schools between 1996 and 1997. Pre-preparatory age groups have developed strongly, with a cumulative growth of 6.3 per cent among 2-4 year-olds. In the 5 to 10 age group the cumulative growth is 3.3 per cent. The 11-15 year-old age cohort shows a smaller cumulative reduction (of only 0.4 per cent) than in the previous year. At the top of the age range there are increases among 16 and 17 year-olds of 0.7 and 5.0 per cent respectively.

#### Fees and Costs

Fee increases in 1996-97 averaged 5.2 per cent compared with 4.8 per cent in the previous year and 4.2 per cent in 1994-95. Average rises were 2.6 per cent in 1993-94, 8.3 per cent in 1992-93 and substantially higher before that. Increases averaged about 10 per cent per annum in the 1980s. Average termly fees are recorded in **Tables 4 & 5**, page 15. The former includes a regional breakdown of pupil numbers and average termly fees for full- and weekly-boarders and for day pupils in day and boarding schools.


**Table 5** compares percentage increases in average day and boarding fees (under school associations) over a five year period with increases in inflation, measured by the Retail Prices Index (RPI), average earnings and teachers' pay (DfEE figures).

The RPI is a poor guide to what happens to school fees or, indeed, rising costs in any sector of school, further or higher education. Schools are labour and capital intensive and reflect these costs to a greater extent than the elements which make up the RPI. Independent schools are different from other sectors, however, in that their rising costs, and therefore fees, are more visible than those in schools funded by general taxation. Their fees must also cover capital expenditure, maintenance and administration as well as tuition - items which are usually and misleadingly overlooked when facile comparisons are made between per capital spending in the independent and maintained sectors.


Although variations in annual fee rises are reflections of increased staff costs, schools have little control over them. Most schools pay at least teachers' national awards, plus national incremental scales. Salaries of teachers and other staff are the largest items of school expenditure, accounting for up to 80 per cent of a day school's costs and around 60 per cent in a boarding school. The Government pay award to teachers in 1996 was a phased increase on the basic scale of 3.75 per cent. As most teachers received this award and incremental rises provided for in national agreements, many schools faced an overall increase in their pay bill of about five per cent.

One of the distinguishing features of independent schools, so far as parents are concerned, is that their teaching groups are generally smaller than those in other types of school. This is particularly the case in schools with boarding pupils. Fee increases are the price parents pay for generously staffed schools as well as updated facilities. After years of steadily improving staff:pupil ratios, this Census records a standstill with a ratio across all schools of 1:10.6 and 1:12.3 weighted for sixth-forms. [Table 2, page 13.]

Graph 2 illustrates fee rises since 1986-87 and relates them to the RPI and average earnings over the same period. Teachers' salaries have outpaced the RPI in most years through national awards alone, excluding their incremental rises. Only national awards are included in teachers' percentage increases in **Table 5**.




Spending in total and per pupil on new and improved buildings and equipment is recorded in **Table 8**, **page 17** and **Graph 3**. During 1996 schools spent £247.2 million, representing £525 per pupil. Although they spent more on improvements to buildings and equipment, they spent less on new buildings. Their total spending was down by 4.4 per cent, but the comparison is with 1995 in which there was the biggest per capita expenditure on record and the highest percentage rise for six years. So, although the per capita figure of £525 is less than the £551 recorded in 1995, it is still substantially more than the £500 per pupil spent in 1994.



### More Help for Pupils

More families are being helped with school fees. The number of children receiving help from various sources is now 141,142, an increase of 6.3 percent. They represent 30.0 per cent of all pupils in ISIS schools. Details are given in **Table 7**, page 17 and **Graph 4**.



Most help is given by schools. Their scholarships and bursaries account for 89,788 pupils (19.1 per cent of all pupils), an increase of 3.9 per cent. Government assisted places are held by 37,183 (7.9 per cent of all pupils). The rise in their number reflects the expansion of the Assisted Places Scheme in 1996 to include pupils below the age of 11 and more schools. Places paid for by local education authorities and from other sources (such as charitable trusts) rose to 9,541 and 4,630 respectively.

### **Booming Overseas Recruitment**

1996-97 was another excellent year for schools' recruitment of foreign and British expatriate children.

**Table 9** on **page 18** shows *new pupils* from overseas who have joined schools since the previous Census day in 1996. This is *not*, therefore, the total number of overseas pupils in our schools (which is probably in the region of 20,000).

Foreign pupils coming during the year totalled 7,931, compared with 7,392 in the previous year. This is a rise of 8.8 per cent, not far short of the record 9.6 per cent increase in recruitment in 1993-94 and 9.3 per cent in 1995-96.

For the third year running, the number of British expatriate children has also increased - by 5.5 per cent to 1,714. The only reduction is among children of parents serving overseas in the British armed forces, whose number has fallen every year since our records began. Unusually, the number of newly-arrived British expatriate children exceeds the number of children from forces families. The drop in the number of boarders from service families, caused by personnel cutbacks and changes in the Ministry of Defence Boarding School Allowance, accounts for 35 per cent of the decline in boarding numbers since the late 1980s.

The largest percentage increases among foreign pupils are those from North and South America, the Middle East and East Asia. But it is the rest of Europe which supplies the

largest single proportion of recruits (30.3 per cent of all foreign pupils) and mainland European numbers, from France to Russia, háve increased by 6.2 per cent. *Germany* remains the largest source of mainland European pupils, as well as the UK's largest trading partner. East Asia accounts for 45.1 per cent of all foreign pupils; their origins are separately recorded for Hong Kong, Taiwan and the remainder of the Far East.

Areas providing the largest proportions of overseas pupils or the most significant percentage increases are those where ISIS International has made repeated appearances at British and international education exhibitions or launched new promotional activities. During 1996 it was present for the first time at exhibitions in South Korea and Brazil.

Germany and Hong Kong are examples of particularly active ISIS International representation throughout the year. The reduction in new pupils from Hong Kong probably reflects that territory's residents making their educational plans well in advance of this year's change of regime; over the previous two years the number of new Hong Kong pupils rose by 18 per cent. Some of the rise in British expatriate numbers may also be attributable to increased movement of families from the colony back to the UK. Interest in day schools has also increased among Hong Kong Chinese families, some of whom have bought property in the UK or have close relatives in the UK with whom their children are able to live.

Recruitment from overseas is strengthening not only in those countries where British independent schools have traditionally held a strong appeal but in areas (such as Taiwan and South Korea) whose post-war links with the United States had led their students into American education. Spectacular inroads into these markets have been made in recent years by British universities and schools.

Expertise in English language teaching, high standards and academic rigour at preparatory and senior school levels, extra-curricular opportunities and good discipline and pastoral care are all factors which attract overseas pupils. Senior schools also offer the prospect of the high A-level grades necessary for entry to well-regarded British universities.


The benefits to Britain of strong links with new generations of well-educated foreigners who will occupy influential positions in their own countries are inestimable. The value to Britain in foreign currency of the fees of overseas pupils *can* be estimated, at more than £200 million. **[Table 9A** is new this year. It records the overseas fee income of almost 16,000 pupils in 567schools.]

### Leavers After A-Levels

Table 10, page 18 shows the high proportion (89.0 per cent) of independent school leavers going on to higher education - usually university - after taking A-levels or other sixth-form qualifications. It does not record those who leave immediately after GCSE. Three associations - GBGSA, GSA and ISA - include some schools which do not have sixth-forms and therefore do not offer A-level courses: their statistics reflect that fact. The table may understate higher education entrants because of the difficulty involved in keeping track of leavers who defer their university entry.

### Size: Boarding/Day; Boys/Girls

**Table 11, page 19** records sizes of schools. Each figure under the associations represents the number of schools whose pupil rolls are within the stated range. The average size of an ISIS school is 362; 834 of our schools have fewer than 350 pupils. **See Graph 5**.



**Table 12, page 20** shows percentages of boarders: for example, there are 31 schools across all associations with 95 per cent or more boarders.

**Table 13, page 20** gives boy/girl ratios. For example, there are 174 all-boy schools and more than 200 all-girl schools; the others are mixed in varying proportions.

### General & Association Tables

All the general tables are on pages 13 to 20. Those which follow (pages 22 to 35) relate to separate associations of schools. Please refer to the initials at the top of each page.

#### Multiple Membership

Some schools belong to more than one association. In the *general tables* on pages 13 to 20 each school is recorded under one association only. This avoids counting the same school and its pupils twice, but produces distortions in the apparent size of associations.

The Society of Headmasters & Headmistresses of Independent Schools (SHMIS) appears to have only 53 members. Its full membership is 75, but some schools are also members of other associations (chiefly HMC) and they have their figures recorded under these associations in the general tables. There are 17 schools in the Independent Schools Association (ISA) which also belong to other associations and do not appear under ISA in the general tables.

Governing bodies of schools whose heads are in HMC, GSA or SHMIS belong to either GBA or GBGSA. But there are some schools in the governing bodies' associations whose heads are not members of an association of heads: these appear in the general tables separately under GBA or GBGSA.

In association tables (on pages 22 to 35), for the first time, ALL schools in SHMIS, GBA, GBGSA and ISA are included in the tables for those associations, ie not just the schools which belong to only one association of heads or governors. These four associations are the ones mainly affected by multiple membership. In this way their strength is fully represented.

### Acknowledgements

This year all but two of the 1,312 eligible schools returned their Census forms. We are grateful to the heads, deputy heads, bursars, secretaries and other members of staff who co-operated and to the association chairmen, president and secretaries.

Julian Bewick and the Monkton Combe Computing Service devoted many hours of patient and careful work to this survey. They must be congratulated on producing a document which is greatly valued by schools, researchers, educationalists, journalists, commentators and others for the detailed information it provides on the major part of the independent sector.

**Schools in Census:** All but two of the 1,312 ISIS-member schools are included in the 1997 survey, taken on Census Day 16 January. ISIS schools are those in membership of the major governors' and heads' associations which represent about 60% of all UK independent schools. The 473,816 pupils recorded in them in January 1997 account for about 80% of the total number of pupils in independent schools.

Day/Boarding: The Census shows that 83.6% of ISIS school pupils are day boys and girls, 16.4% are boarders. The boarding proportion has been declining steadily for many years: in 1982, for example, 27.7% of pupils were boarders and in 1989 23.4%. Separate recording of weekly boarders has been discontinued this year: they are now counted with full boarders. But occasional boarding is recorded for the first time (Table 3A), to reflect the flexibility of schools' boarding facilities and their use by day pupils on an occasional basis: 13,013 day pupils spent 95,071 nights in school during the year.

**Boys/Girls:** 52.9% of pupils are boys, 47.1% girls. The proportion of girls has steadily increased since the ISIS Census was established on its present comparative basis in 1982, when girls were only 41.7% of the total.

**Tables 2-9** compare 1,298 ISIS schools which took part in the 1996 and 1997 surveys. The 1997 figures are shown in larger type and the percentage changes in italics.

The increase in the total number of pupils is the second largest since the ISIS Census was first produced in its present form 15 years ago. The number of day pupils has increased by 9,569 and the number of boarders has dropped by 1,929, giving a net increase of 7,640 (1.7%).

Previous years' figures were: 1991: +0.7% (net gain of 3,079 pupils); 1992: -0.2% (net loss 1,065); 1993: -1.5% (net loss 6,973); 1994: -1.0% (net loss 4,476); 1995: -0.1% (net loss 509); 1996: +0.6% (net gain 2,877).

The rise in day pupil numbers this year is almost a record and the drop in the number of boarders is the second smallest ever recorded.

This table indicates the change in size of each year cohort since 1996, with cumulative figures for the main educational stages.

Strong development continues in the pre-preparatory sector, with a cumulative growth of 6.3% among 2-4 year-olds. In the 5 to 10 age group the cumulative growth is 3.3% (up from 1.8% in the previous year). The 11-15 year-old cohort shows a smaller cumulative reduction (of 0.4 per cent) than in the previous year. At the top end of the age range there are increases among 16 and 17 year-olds of 0.7% and 5.0% respectively.

The average rise in fees was 5.2%, compared with 4.8% in the previous year.

The RPI (Retail Prices Index) measure of inflation is a less relevant comparison than teachers' pay, since school fees increases chiefly reflect:

- · generous staffing;
- rising salaries and wages of teaching and non-teaching staff (over which schools have little or no control as most pay at least the national awards and incremental scales);
- investment in buildings and equipment, as well as the rising costs of goods and services bought by schools.

Note that the averages above are for schools of various types across the full age range. Averages for day and boarding within particular types of school (eg., preparatory and senior) are more clearly differentiated in **Table 5.** Note also the differences between day fees in entirely day schools and the higher day fees in schools with a mixture of day and boarding pupils.

The increasing number of pupils receiving help with their fees has been a long-term trend; it accelerated during the recession as more families relied on bursaries from schools to enable children at crucial stages (such as approaching public examinations) to complete their courses. The increase of 6.3% this year brings the proportion of children receiving help from various sources to 30%; in 1982 the proportion was only 15.8%. School bursaries and scholarships now help 19.1% of all pupils.

The rise in the number of Government assisted places reflects the expansion of the Assisted Places Scheme in 1996 to include pupils below the age of 11 and more schools. They now account for 7.9% of all pupils.

During 1996 schools spent £247.2 million, 4.4% less than in 1995 (a year which showed the biggest per capita expenditure on record and the highest percentage rise for six years). This was equivalent to £525 per pupil, 6% less than in the record year but substantially more than in 1994.

The 8.8% increase in the number of new foreign pupils who entered ISIS schools between January 1996 and January 1997 is not far short of the record increases of 9.6% in 1993-94 and 9.3% in 1995-96. The largest percentage increases in numbers have been from East Asia, the Middle East and North and South America. Mainland Europe now supplies more than 30% of all foreign pupils, with continuing steady growth, while East Asia accounts for 45%. The principal areas of growth are also those where ISIS International has concentrated its promotion of British independent schools.

The total number of foreign pupils in ISIS schools is around 20,000. Their fees are estimated to be worth more than £200 million to Britain in foreign currency.

Pupils from British expatriate families also increased, for only the third year since ISIS records began, and overtook the number from families serving overseas in the armed forces. The drop in the latter group is a long-term trend and accounts for a large part of the decline in total boarding numbers in recent years.

# NOTES ON TABLES FOR INDIVIDUAL ASSOCIATIONS

Tables on the following pages show changes that occurred between January 1996 and January 1997.

In order that fair comparisons can be made, only those schools which completed the census in BOTH years have figures included in the tables.

**NEW IN 1997** - Figures given in the following tables are for ALL the schools in each association. Some schools belong to more than one association (eg all HMC schools are also in GBA).

GSA figures include pupils from one school which is also a member of HMC.

HMC figures include pupils from one school which is also a member of GSA.

IAPS figures include pupils from some all-age schools whose Junior School Heads are members of IAPS.

A few schools changed the associations to which they belong during the year between the two census days. Their figures are included in tables for their current associations.

Age ranges for schools in England, Wales and Ireland are calculated using 1st September as a base. Those in Scotland use 1st January.

Tables 14A to 20A show numbers of pupils in the schools. Current numbers are shown in normal print, with last year's figures printed below in italics. Percentage changes are printed as the third line of each group of three lines. In cases of large percentage change, it is wise to look at the figures above to see if the change is significant.

TABLES 14B to 20B show the numbers of pupils and the average fees by areas. A blank entry in a fees or numbers column indicates that there is no school of the relevant category in the area. A blank in the per cent change row means there is no significant change.

TABLES 14C, D and E to 20C, D and E deal with staffing.

TABLES 14F and G to 20F and G deal with numbers and courses of study of sixth form pupils.

TABLES 14H, I and J to 20H, I and J show the sources of entry and destinations of leavers. Proportions shown in each category are believed to be accurate, but total numbers are higher than those shown. These tables are amongst the most difficult for schools to complete accurately as sources and destinations are not always known.

### **NEW IN 1997**

TABLES 14K to 20K deal with occasional boarding by day pupils. The left column shows the number of pupils at each age group (ages 0 - 4, 5 - 7, 8 - 11/13, 11/13 - 15, 16+) and the right hand column shows the total number of nights spent boarding during the year.

TABLES 14L to 20L show the number of member schools, and the number of schools which completed the census last year and this year. The left hand column shows numbers for schools whose only membership is of the association; the right hand column includes all schools which are members of the association.

TABLES 15M to 20M show the number of pupils whose fees are paid from overseas sources and the total **TERMLY** fee paid for the January term 1997.
