This report is based on a survey carried out in January 2010. All 1,257 schools in UK membership of the constituent associations of ISC completed the survey. In addition three schools from the Republic of Ireland completed the survey and are included in our tables where appropriate. All information relates to January 2010, except for expenditure on buildings and equipment, which relates to the financial year ending at various dates in 2009.

Appendix One gives a snapshot of all ISC schools as they were in January 2010. Appendix Two shows comparative figures for the schools that completed the Census in both 2009 and 2010 and is therefore the best guide for annual change.

ISC constituent associations are: The Association of Governing Bodies of Independent Schools (AGBIS), the Council of British International Schools (COBIS), the Girls' Schools Association (GSA), the Headmasters' and Headmistresses' Conference (HMC), The Independent Association of Prep Schools (IAPS), the Independent Schools Association (ISA), the Independent Schools' Bursars Association (ISBA) and the Society of Headmasters and Headmistresses of Independent Schools (SHMIS).

Two associations are affiliate members of ISC: The Boarding Schools' Association (BSA) and The Scottish Council of Independent Schools (SCIS).

The data contained in this report does not include figures for COBIS schools due to the complexities of comparing UK and international schools' data.

The ISC research team would like to thank all participating schools for the considerable time taken to complete the Census and to check returns, particularly during the busy start of the spring term and when other census completions are required. The online data collection system is working well and allows us to continually improve and ensure accuracy.

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HEADLINE RESULTS

1. Pupil numbers fall by only 0.6%

There are now 511,886 pupils at the 1,260 ISC member schools. Pupil numbers fell from last year's peak by around 0.6%. There has been a net loss of 5 schools since 2009.

2. Lowest fee increase for 16 years

Fees rose by an average of 4.0%, the smallest annual increase since 1994.

3. ISC schools attract more international pupils

There are now 23,307 non-British pupils with parents living overseas, a like-for-like increase of 7.4%.

4. ISC schools provide more than half a billion pounds in fee assistance 32.5% of ISC pupils receive help with their fees, with ISC schools providing £540 million in assistance annually.

5. More than 4 in 5 schools are involved in partnerships with maintained schools or the wider community

1,010 ISC schools share facilities and expertise with people outside the sector, underlining the public benefit that they provide.

6. 56,930 pupils at ISC schools have been identified as having special educational needs (SEN)

ISC schools tailor their teaching, curriculum and facilities to the needs of the individual pupil, and are able to cater for a wide range of different needs.

7. Pupil-teacher ratio remains low

There is one teacher for every 9.4 pupils in ISC schools.

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Pupil Numbers

1,260 ISC member schools completed the 2010 Annual Census. This included 1,257 schools in the UK and an additional three schools from the Republic of Ireland.

There are now 511,886 pupils at ISC member schools, down slightly from 514,531 in 2009. The proportions of day (86.7%) and boarding pupils (13.3%) are broadly in line with last year. The share of girls and boys at ISC schools is very nearly equal, with girls representing 49.0% of all pupils.


Fig 2. Change in pupil numbers since 2009

Figure 2 shows year-on-year comparisons, based on the 1,245 schools that completed the Census in 2009 and 2010. The number of pupils in these schools has fallen by only 0.6% since 2009, from 511,463 to 508,234. This is a lower drop than might have been expected given the tone of media reports over the last twelve months and the depth of the recession, with GDP contracting by 4.9% in 2009. The drop represents a marginal check on the trend of growth in recent years: between 2005/06 and 2008/09 the average annual growth in pupil numbers had been 0.3%, and brings the sector closer in line to recent trends in the maintained sector where, over the same period, there had been an average annual decline in pupil numbers of 0.6%. Figure 3 shows how pupil number growth in the independent sector has outpaced that in the maintained sector for more than a decade. The underlying trend of the last quarter of a century has been for the sector to grow: indeed, Figure 4 shows that in 19 of the last 26 years there has been a year-on-year increase in the number of pupils at ISC schools.

Moreover, Figure 4 shows that this year's drop is not as severe as those that took place during the recession of the early 1990s, with the fall being no worse than that of 2005.

The decline in pupil numbers was slightly more noticeable among boarders, where there was a 1.1% drop, rather than among day pupils where the decline was 0.6%.

The change in pupil numbers from 2009 was not consistent across all age groups. Among schools that completed both the 2009 and 2010 Census there was a rise of 0.2% among sixth-form pupils and a rise of 0.5% among pupils in Years 7 to 11; there was a decline of 2.1% among pupils from Reception to Year 6 and a decline of 0.8% among Nursery pupils.

There were also regional variations in pupil number changes. There was a rise of 1.0% at schools in Scotland who participated in the Census in both 2009 and 2010, while at schools in Greater London the drop in pupil numbers was just 0.1%. In contrast, pupil numbers at schools in the North of England experienced a drop in pupil numbers of 2.2%. The drop in pupil numbers was felt more noticeably at schools in rural areas where the year-on-year decline was 0.7%; at urban and inner city schools the decline was 0.2%.



Fig 3. Percentage change in pupil numbers since 1996 by sector





Ethnic Diversity

76.2% of ISC pupils are from a White British background while 23.8% are from a minority ethnic background. Figures for the maintained sector only cover schools in England: these show that in 2009, the most recent year for which figures are currently available, 77.2% of pupils were from a White British background and 22.8% were from a minority ethnic background. Among pupils at ISC schools in England in 2010, this compares with figures of 75.9% and 24.1% respectively.

Further analysis of the ethnicity of pupils from day schools alone indicates that 74.5% are White British and 25.5% are from a minority ethnic background. Excluding data from boarding schools ensures that the figures are not skewed by pupils from overseas attending boarding schools. These figures are further testimony to the diversity of ISC schools.

Some schools do not yet collect records of ethnicity; nevertheless 83.4% of schools were able to submit some information. The figures for the ethnic mix within ISC schools are based on data for 72.5% of all ISC pupils.

Overseas Pupils

In ISC schools, there are currently 23,307 non-British pupils whose parents live overseas. This highlights the attraction of an education at an ISC school to a global market and reflects the PISA findings from the OECD which rank UK independent schools as among the best in the world.

36.1% of non-British pupils with parents living overseas come from Hong Kong and China. The next highest share from a single country comes from Germany (9.7%). Europe, as a whole, accounts for 32.1% of all non-British pupils with parents living overseas.

In 2010, non-British pupils make up 4.6% of the total ISC pupil population. Year-on-year comparisons show the number of non-British pupils with parents resident overseas to have risen by 7.4%.

The growth has been predominantly based on increasing numbers of pupils with parents living in Europe and Asia choosing to come to ISC schools. The fastest growing markets – though not always the largest – are in the Far East; Central Asia; India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh; and the Middle East. There has been a significant drop in the number of pupils from Japan. Further details can be seen from Table 8 in Appendix One and Table 7 in Appendix Two. There are 10,030 non-British pupils with parents living overseas who are new to their school this year, although not all of these pupils will be new to the sector: many will have simply moved from one school to another. New non-British pupils with parents living overseas represent 43.0% of all overseas pupils at ISC schools. Further details can be seen in Table 9 in Appendix One and Table 8 in Appendix Two.

Fig 8. Non-British pupils with parents living overseas





Fig 9. Percentage change of non-British pupils with parents living overseas

School Fees

The average overall fee is up by 4.0%. This is the smallest annual fee increase for 16 years. The overall average termly fee is £4,186 (excluding nursery fees). The average boarding fee is £8,003 and the average day fee

These fee increases compare with the CPI measure, under which, in the 12 months to January 2010, the cost of living rose by 3.5%. More significantly, the education component of CPI was 5.2% for the same period.

Contribution To Fees

A total of 161,605 pupils receive help with their fees: this represents 32.5% of all pupils. The value of this help totals more than £660 million per year. More than 80% of total fee assistance comes directly from the schools themselves: ISC schools provided more than £540 million of assistance with fees in the academic year 2009/10. Schools gave approximately twice as much assistance in the form of bursaries as they did in scholarships. Over £250 million of assistance was in the form of means-tested bursaries.

Fig 11. Contributions to fees ranked by total value of assistance



Over the last year, ISC schools have responded to the economic climate by making significant cutbacks to capital spending. Schools have reduced expenditure per pupil by 7.9% on last year, to £1,424. Almost two thirds of the total fall in expenditure came from cuts to spending on new buildings, where, across all ISC schools, the annual spend was £42.6 million less than in 2009, an average cut of 11.3% at each school. Nonetheless, cuts in spending have taken place across the board, as Figure 12 demonstrates. Further details are available in Table 7 in Appendix One, and Table 6 in Appendix Two.

Partnerships

ISC schools are increasingly forming partnerships with schools in the maintained sector and with the wider community, sharing facilities and expertise. 1,010 schools reported that they were involved in partnership activities.

Teaching Staff

A total of 54,284 full-time equivalent teachers are employed at ISC schools. At schools that returned the Census in both 2009 and 2010, the number of full-time equivalent teachers rose by 0.1%. There has been a rise of 0.8% in the number of part-time teachers employed by ISC schools and a drop of 0.3% in full-time teachers. This slight shift towards part-time teaching has meant a 2.3% increase in the number of hours worked by part-time staff.

The changes in teacher numbers have meant that the pupil-teacher ratio has fallen to 9.4:1. This compares with an average of 16.9:1 in maintained mainstream schools in 2009. In ISC member schools the weighted pupil-teacher ratio (with each sixth-former counted as two) was down fractionally at 11.0:1 from 11.1:1 in 2009. These low pupil-teacher ratios reflect the commitment of many schools to teaching a wide range of subjects, even if class sizes are small and it is not economic to do so.

38.8% of full-time equivalent teachers at ISC schools are men. This compares with a figure of 30% of full-time regular qualified teachers in maintained schools in England in 2008, the most recent year for which figures are available.

The sector remains attractive to teachers: in the last year, 1,540 teachers arrived from the maintained sector; the number of teachers leaving to go to maintained schools was 577. The only sector from which there are more new staff arriving at ISC schools than there were in 2009 is industry, from which recruitment of new staff has risen by 7.2%. Teacher turnover, as a proportion of the number of full-time staff employed, fell to 11.7% from 12.9% in 2009. For further details see Table 10 in Appendix Two.

We have undertaken a thorough study of the teachers working at ISC member schools and will publish the findings in May.


Fig 14. Teachers and pupil-teacher ratio

SEN Provision


56,930 pupils at ISC schools have been identified as having special educational needs (SEN). The most common SEN is dyslexia or dyspraxia with over 1,000 schools having at least one pupil with this condition. 2,512 pupils are statemented.



Boarding and Day Schools

67,856 pupils board at ISC schools, making up 13.3% of total pupil numbers. 61% of ISC schools have no boarding pupils at all. The majority of schools with boarding still have over 75% day pupils. Less than 10% of ISC schools are predominantly boarding, and little more than 1% have no day pupils.

School Size

ISC schools vary in size from having under 50 pupils to over 1,700, although most schools have under 350 pupils. Nonetheless, the long tail of large schools drags up the mean school size: the average school has around 406 pupils. This is almost identical to the figure in 2009, although there has been a general trend over the last two decades of increasing school size, as Figure 17 demonstrates.

Fig 17. Size of school





Fig 18. Mean school size from 1985 to 2010




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Single-Sex and Co-Education


Fig 19. Boys as a percentage of all pupils

Most ISC schools have both boys and girls as pupils, although 21.4% are entirely single-sex. As Figure 19 shows, there are many other schools that are predominantly single-sex schools. Single-sex girls' schools are more common than single-sex boys' schools; co-ed schools tend to have slightly more boys than girls.

Entrance to Higher Education

The vast majority of independently-educated school leavers continue to Higher Education. This year 36,671 post-18 school leavers went on from ISC schools to Higher Education, the highest figure ever. The proportion of the leaving cohort going on to Higher Education is 92%.
