This report is based on a survey carried out in January 2018. All 1,326 schools in UK membership of the constituent associations of ISC ("ISC schools") completed the survey.

Appendix One gives a snapshot of ISC schools as they were in January 2018. Appendix Two shows comparative figures for the schools that completed the Census in both 2017 and 2018 and is therefore the best guide for annual change.

ISC's constituent associations are: the Association of Governing Bodies of Independent Schools (AGBIS), the Girls' Schools Association (GSA), the Headmasters' and Headmistresses' Conference (HMC), the Independent Association of Prep Schools (IAPS), the Independent Schools Association (ISA), the Independent Schools' Bursars Association (ISBA) and the Society of Heads (SofH).

Four associations are affiliate members of ISC: the Council of British International Schools (COBIS), the Boarding Schools' Association (BSA), the Scottish Council of Independent Schools (SCIS) and the Welsh Independent Schools Council (WISC).

The Society of Heads was previously known as the Society of Headmasters and Headmistresses of Independent Schools and was referred to as SHMIS in Censuses up to 2011.

The ISC Research Team would like to thank all participating schools for the considerable time taken to complete the Census and to check returns, particularly during the busy start of the spring term and when other Census completions are required.

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Foreword

Independent schools play an important part in the UK's internationally-recognised and diverse education system. Our independence from central government and local authorities enables each ISC school to follow its own curriculum – offering a wider range of learning opportunities – and be innovative and experimental, better to meet the needs of pupils.

You will find that typical independent school parents are part of an upper-middle income family where both parents work and they choose to spend the whole of one salary on school fees to secure the best possible education for their children.

In recent years independent schools have raised money to subsidise the fees of lower income families, widening access. Students from disadvantaged backgrounds, who are on bursaries at ISC schools, often go on to secure further financial help in order to attend top UK universities. This Census tells us that a third of pupils at our schools benefit from reduced fees. Independent schools themselves are committed to educating the broadest spectrum across society. Many were Direct Grant schools in the past and have large numbers of alumni who came from lower income families.

Independent schooling is not the only way in which parents choose to spend money on education. For example, many pay for nursery education and a quarter of parents spend money on private tutors. Half of the population go to university where they pay fees, often supported by parents. There was a time when all students going to school or university paid nothing. Now universities are allowed to charge £9,250 per year; if we add maintenance loans, the cost is higher than our average day school fees.

With Brexit edging closer, it should be noted that independent schools continue to be globally-conscious environments, which play a valuable role on the international stage. Consider non-British parents who come to live in Britain (especially in London) for a few years because they work here. A large number of these highly skilled parents would not have come to the UK had it not been for the attraction of good independent schools.

Many overseas leaders were educated in British independent schools and this has helped the country to maintain especially good diplomatic relationships with countries like Jordan, Malaysia and Thailand. Because UK independent schools are so strong, other countries have encouraged them to set up partner schools abroad; recent years have seen such schools established in China and the Middle East and this has strengthened relationships with these important trading partners.

ISC schools are widely regarded as being among the best in the world. This Census report helps to describe their characteristics.

Executive Summary

1. LOWEST FEE INCREASE SINCE 1994 AND INCREASING AMOUNT OF FEE ASSISTANCE

- Average fee increases this year were 3.4% compared with 3.5% last year and the lowest since 1994.
- Nearly £1billion was provided in fee assistance for pupils at ISC schools; 8% more than last year.
- More than £800m of this £1billion came directly from ISC schools; 7% more than last year.
- Almost £400m related to means-tested assistance, 4% more than last year.
- 5,863 pupils paid no fees at all, 121 more pupils than last year.

2. HIGHEST NUMBER OF PUPILS AT ISC SCHOOLS SINCE RECORDS BEGAN IN 1974

- There are now a record 529,164 pupils at 1,326 ISC member schools, up from 522,879 in 2017.
- At the 1,283 schools completing the Census in both 2017 and 2018, pupil numbers have risen by 0.1%.
- Small changes were recorded within different subsets of pupils:
 - Marginal shift in the proportion of overseas pupils (overseas pupils account for 5.4% of all pupils this year, compared with 5.3% last year).
 - Small change in the number of boarding pupils (boarding pupils account for 13.2% this year, compared to 13.4% last year).
 - Marginal shift in the number of pupils attending co-educational schools (75.7% this year, 75.0% last year).
 - A higher proportion of pupils with SEND were recorded this year (15.0% of all ISC pupils are recorded as having an SEND compared with 13.7% last year). This might reflect the redesign of this section of the Census this year.
 - The proportion of minority ethnic pupils has increased to reflect general population trends (from 31.7% last year to 33.4% this year).
- The most significant variations are regional with some areas experiencing increases in pupil numbers and others reductions in pupil numbers.

3. DESPITE ONLY 50% OF ISC SCHOOLS BEING ACADEMICALLY SELECTIVE, ISC PUPILS SIGNIFICANTLY OUTPERFORM THE NATIONAL AND GLOBAL AVERAGES

- 50% of independent schools' entries for A-level Chemistry were awarded A or A* compared with 30% of state entries in the UK.
- More than four times as many ISC pupils gained 40 points in the International Baccalaureate compared with the worldwide average. Moreover, ISC pupils made up nearly a quarter of pupils worldwide gaining the maximum score of 45 points.
- At GCSE, 36% of all entries for Maths were awarded a grade of between 7 and 9, compared with 20% of state entries in England. Note this is the first year of the new grading system.
- 91% of ISC pupils continue to higher education, with the majority (54%) attending a Russell Group university.
- There are nearly 60,000 full-time equivalent teachers at ISC schools, equating to a pupil-teacher ratio of 9:1 (compared with a pupil-teacher ratio in the state sector of 18:1).

4. UK INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS ARE PROUD OF THEIR GLOBAL OUTLOOK AND ABILITY TO COMPETE ON A GLOBAL SCALE

- There are 28,513 pupils at ISC schools whose parents live overseas. Whilst this is only a small proportion of all pupils (5.4%), ISC schools welcome the cultural diversity these pupils bring to their schools.
- Furthermore, a number of ISC schools operate campuses overseas, educating 32,330 pupils.
- Whilst the majority of ISC pupils study at UK universities, nearly 2,000 ISC pupils choose to study overseas in nearly 500 different overseas institutions.
- This year, 449 teachers from outside the UK came to teach in ISC schools.

4:

• ISC pupils perform significantly better at the International Baccalaureate compared with the worldwide average.

5. 86% OF ISC SCHOOLS ENGAGE IN PUBLIC BENEFIT ACTIVITIES (DESPITE ONLY 75% OF ISC SCHOOLS HAVING CHARITABLE STATUS)


- The types of partnerships vary from academy sponsorship to seconding teaching staff to serving as governors at state schools.
- Whilst some ISC schools are very facility-rich, many are not. For example, collectively there are 68 all-weather athletics tracks among the 1,326 ISC schools. Assuming all these were shared with state schools, they would only serve a small fraction of the 28,000 state-funded schools in the UK. Collectively, 1,911 facilities are shared with local state schools.
- Beyond partnerships with state schools, between £12m and £16m was raised for charities at ISC schools this year and 860 ISC schools organised volunteering opportunities for their staff and / or pupils.
- Finally, it is interesting that the percentage of ISC schools with charitable status has dropped this year to 75% (from 77% last year). 32 of the new schools to membership were non-charity schools. In addition, 9 existing schools changed their legal status from charitable to non-charitable this year. No schools converted the other way.

ISC Schools: Location, School Type, Structure and Size

Fig 1. School location and pupil density

Map 1 relates to ISC schools only and covers all of the UK (ISC data 2018). Map 2 illustrates pupil density¹ for all independent schools, but is confined to England and Wales only (DfE and Welsh Government data 2017). Map 3 shows a detailed breakdown of pupil density in London.





Fig 2. ISC school membership

This page illustrates the number of schools in ISC membership by school type. We have categorised the schools by their pupils' age, gender and whether they have day or boarding pupils and each school is counted in one (and only one) category for each type. This page also reconciles changes in membership between 2017 and 2018.



Changing Membership

Since last year's Census, where 1,301 schools were in membership of the constituent associations: 11 schools left, 43 schools joined and 13 schools consolidated records with affiliated schools to form 6 schools for Census reporting. There are therefore 1,326 schools in membership this year, 1,283 of which participated in both the 2017 and 2018 Census; the figures from these schools make up the tables in Appendix Two for an accurate comparison of the sector.

ISC Schools: Location, School Type, Structure and Size

Figure 1 clearly illustrates that the majority of ISC schools are located in southern England; indeed, 51% of ISC schools are located in London, the South East and South Central. Of all independent schools in England (ISC and non-ISC schools), 49% are located in these regions, educating 54% of all independent pupils.

Figure 2 categorises ISC schools into three main types – by age range, by gender and by day/boarding. These are the categories that are used most frequently throughout this report. It is worth noting, however, that ISC schools could be categorised in other ways too. For example, 75% of ISC schools hold charitable status, 25% do not.

Fig 3. ISC school structures


Figure 3 illustrates the numbers of ISC schools according to whether they are junior, mixed-age or senior. ISC schools cover a range of different year groups, sometimes making categorisation difficult. For completeness, Figure 3 shows the most common sets of year group ranges found within ISC schools. The blue bars show year group structure for each subcategory. The numbers in white indicate the number of schools that share that particular year group structure.



Note this represents a drop from last year where 77% of schools held charitable status. We had 32 new non-charity schools to membership this year. In addition, 9 existing schools changed their legal status from charitable to non-charitable this year. No schools changed status the other way. Another way we might categorise schools is in relation to selectivity; 50% of ISC schools are selective, 50% are not.

Figure 2 shows that ISC schools are more likely to be junior schools than senior or mixed-age schools, they are more likely to be co-educational schools than single-sex and more likely to be day schools as opposed to boarding schools. Figure 3 illustrates the difficulties in categorising independent schools neatly owing to their differing structures.

As well as displaying differing structures, ISC schools vary significantly in size from having fewer than 50 pupils to over 1,700, although the majority of schools have fewer than 350 pupils. The mean school size is just under 400, but the mode is just under 200. In addition, schools have been steadily growing in size since the mid-1980s. In 1985 the average school size was 314; it now stands at 399 but peaked at 408 in 2015 and was 402 last year. The drop this year is interesting but can be explained by the change in membership profile this year. Of the 43 new schools to membership, 26 had fewer than 150 pupils and the average mean size for all 43 new schools was 174.

Finally, as illustrated in Figure 4, school size varies according to the type of school; senior schools tend to be larger than junior schools, schools with boarding pupils tend to be larger than schools with only day pupils, and schools that are entirely single-sex tend to be larger than co-educational schools. Due to these size variances, the remainder of this report focuses on pupil numbers to illustrate trends within the sector.



Pupil Numbers

There are now 529,164 pupils at ISC schools, up from 522,879 in 2017 and therefore pupil numbers now stand at a new high since records began in 1974, as illustrated by Figure 5. If we consider only

those schools in membership this year and last year, we still see an increase in pupil numbers of 0.1%.

Pupil Numbers: By Region

Whilst overall pupil numbers have grown nationally at ISC schools, regionally the growth varies as illustrated by Figure 6. For example, pupil numbers in Wales are up 1.8% whereas in the North East they are down 1.7%. It is important to note, however, that smaller regions (in terms of prevalence of ISC schools) are more susceptible

to fluctuations. For example, there are only 20 ISC schools in Wales. Last year Wales saw a rise of 0.4%; this year it is 1.8%. Similarly there are only 16 schools in the North East. This year there has been a 1.7% decline in pupil numbers; last year there was a 0.9% increase.

Pupil Numbers: Single-sex and Co-education

The majority of ISC schools are co-educational; approximately one fifth are single-sex educating 128,618 pupils collectively. 34 ISC schools are single-sex except in their nursery. Excluding these schools in the count of single-sex schools leaves 18% of ISC schools being single-sex.

Further, Figure 7 illustrates that there are many other schools that are **predominantly** single-sex. Single-sex girls' schools are more common than single-sex boys' schools and co-educational schools tend to have slightly more boys than girls.

Fig 7. Girls as a percentage of all pupils





Figure 8 illustrates the proportion of single-sex schools compared with co-education at each of the different year groups. Co-education is very common at nursery level where over 90% of ISC schools have both boys and girls. As children get older, single-sex education becomes more common, reaching a peak between years

7 and 11 where around 35% of ISC schools have year groups of either all boys or all girls. At sixth form there is a slight shift back to co-education. Finally, it is interesting to see that after year 8 there are more than twice as many single-sex girls' schools than single-sex boys' schools.

Pupil Numbers: Boarders

Boarding numbers (based on the day the Census was taken) were 69,979, making up 13.2% of total pupil numbers and down very slightly on the 70,281 boarding pupils reported in 2017. Boarding numbers based on pupils who boarded during the spring term

were 73,837, 766 less than 2017. Figure 9 shows the number of boarders at ISC schools since 2000 and also the percentage of all pupils that they accounted for. In the past 18 years, boarding numbers and proportions have remained relatively flat.

Fig 9. Boarders at ISC schools: 2000-2018




Figure 10 illustrates the proportions of boarding pupils at ISC schools. 474 schools, representing 36% of all ISC schools, cater for boarding pupils. Note, however, that in the large majority (73%) of ISC boarding

schools fewer than half their pupils board. Only 3% (or 12 schools) are exclusively boarding.

Fig 10. Boarders as a percentage of all pupils




Figure 11 illustrates notable regional variations. At schools located in the South West, 25% of pupils board, while at schools in Greater London, just 3% of pupils board.

Figure 12 illustrates boarding patterns for the sector as a whole and by year group. For the sector as a whole, 13% of pupils at ISC schools board. At sixth form this proportion more than doubles to over one third of all pupils. For junior pupils this proportion is significantly lower, with only 2% of pupils boarding.


In addition to boarding being far more prevalent at sixth form than at junior level, sixth form pupils are far more likely to board on a full-time basis: 91% of sixth form boarding pupils are full boarders, 6% are weekly boarders and 3% are flexi boarders. In contrast, fewer than half of junior boarding pupils board full time.

Fig 12. Full, weekly and flexi boarding by year group




Note, for Figure 12, pupils are classed as boarders if they boarded at some point during the spring term 2018. In previous tables and charts, pupils are counted as a boarder if they boarded on Census day (18th January 2018). A larger number of boarders are therefore included in Figure 12.

Pupil Numbers: Movement Between Sectors


Fig 13. New pupils breakdown

Figure 13 illustrates where pupils were educated before joining an ISC school this academic year. More than one quarter of pupils new to the independent sector came from state-funded establishments.

Approximately 7% of school children are currently educated at independent schools in Britain but this figure hides a more complex reality. The likelihood of parents sending their child to an ISC school changes with age. Figure 14 shows that in England over 15% of school¹ pupils aged 16 and over attend an ISC school. At age 11 it is closer to 6% and at age 4 closer to 3%.

Whilst there are subtle points to note¹ regarding the data used in Figure 14, the important conclusion from these illustrations is that the divide between independent and state is therefore a porous one and many more than 7% of pupils attend an independent school at some point during their school career.

¹ It is important to note that we are comparing pupils in schools only. That means we are excluding, for example, home-schooled children and also pupils in further education (FE) colleges at age 16+. Home-schooled pupils are unlikely to change proportions to any significant extent. The Department for Education does not provide data on the numbers of pupils in FE colleges. Data can be extracted from other sources but the data does not separate out those pupils studying A-level or equivalent type courses compared with more vocational courses such as apprenticeships. Using schools only (as per figure 14) is the most reliable dataset but it should be noted that the 15% estimate above is likely to be a slight over estimate.

² Numbers of pupils in ISC schools is taken from the ISC Census dataset. The comparison numbers of school-age children in all schools in England is taken from the Department for Education's Schools, Pupils and their Characteristics dataset.

Pupil Numbers: Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND)

79,281 pupils at ISC schools (15.0% of all pupils) are recorded as having SEND. This compares to 13.7% recorded in 2017. It is important to note, however, that the SEND categories were redefined this year in response to advice from the ISC SEND Expert Group. Therefore, we should not draw too many conclusions

comparing this year with last year. 3,197 pupils are statemented or have EHC plans (4% of all ISC SEND pupils). The most common SEND is Specific Learning Difficulty (SLD) which will include conditions such as dyslexia and dyspraxia and represents 61% of all SEND pupils in ISC schools.

Note, some pupils have more than one SEND: they are counted under each individual category of SEND, but are counted only once in the total.

Pupil Numbers: Ethnicity


Fig 17. Ethnicity comparisons for schools in England: Number of pupils and % share (2017)

67% of all ISC pupils are from a White British background while 33% are from a minority ethnic background. Figures for the state-funded sector only cover schools in England and the latest data available is from 2017. Figure 17 therefore compares ethnicity in England only in

2017 for both ISC schools and state-funded schools. This shows that the ethnic make-up at ISC schools broadly mirrors that of all state schools.

As in the UK as a whole, ethnicity in ISC schools varies by region as illustrated by Figure 18. Finally, as with the trends experienced among pupils in the state-funded sector, the proportion of pupils

from a minority ethnic background at ISC schools has increased in recent years; 23% of ISC pupils were classed as minority ethnic in 2009 1 , compared with 33% now.

Note: Some schools do not yet record ethnicity data; 84% of ISC schools were able to submit ethnicity data, equating to 74% of all ISC pupils. Last year we also recorded ethnicity for 74% of ISC pupils. Scotland is not included in the above chart because ethnicity was only known for 31% of pupils in Scotland.

¹Ethnicity data was first collected in 2009.

International Footprint: Non-British Pupils




Fig 20. Nationality of non-British pupils at ISC schools

There are two categories of non-British pupils at ISC schools: those whose parents live overseas, and those whose parents live in the UK. Figure 20 illustrates the relative numbers of pupils at ISC schools from different regions, as well as whether or not their

parents live in the UK or overseas. Figure 19 provides the numerical breakdown. In total, 47% of non-British pupils have parents living in the UK. As one might expect, this percentage is significantly higher for Irish pupils than it is for Chinese pupils.

International Footprint: Non-British pupils whose parents live overseas

In ISC schools, there are currently 28,513 non-British pupils whose parents live overseas, which represents 5.4% of the total ISC pupil population in 2018. In 2017, there were 27,281, 5.2% of total pupils. If we exclude "international schools" (where more than 90% of the pupils are from overseas), the 5.4% drops to 4.8%. By far the largest numbers of pupils come from China.

Non-British pupils whose parents live overseas are more numerous at ISC schools in the sixth form than as junior pupils: 55% of such pupils are in years 12 and 13, 43% in years 7 to 11, with only 2% in years 6 and below. Not surprisingly, these pupils are much more likely to board: 93% of non-British pupils whose parents live overseas choose to board. There is a slight gender difference among these pupils: 52% are boys and 48% are girls.




Fig 21. Number of non-British pupils whose parents live overseas from selected countries at ISC schools: 2007-2018

Figure 21 illustrates trends in non-British pupils whose parents live overseas since 2007, when the Census first started collecting this data. There has been steady growth in pupil numbers from China in this period. Among pupils from Europe, there was a period of steady growth to 2012 which has since levelled out. Among pupils from Russia, there has been three years of decline after a period of steady growth. Pupil number growth has also levelled off among pupils from Hong Kong after a period of decline.

Since 2009 schools wishing to recruit pupils from outside a non-EEA country (excluding Switzerland) have been required to hold a Tier 4 sponsor licence issued by UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI). Therefore, subject to minor exceptions, any school recruiting non-EEA pupils must be on UKVI's register of licensed sponsors. Our Census discloses that 670 ISC schools are Tier 4 sponsors.

International Footprint: Non-British pupils whose parents live in the UK

In ISC schools there are currently 25,165 non-British pupils whose parents live in the UK, representing 4.8% of all pupils. In 2017 there were 23,192 equating to 4.4% of all pupils. Among these pupils

over 40% come from EEA countries and a further 14% come from the USA.

International Footprint: Overseas Schools

A not insignificant number of ISC schools are operating overseas campuses. There are currently 47 such campuses educating a total of 32,330 pupils. There are therefore more pupils being educated in overseas campuses than there are overseas pupils in ISC schools in the UK. Pupils in overseas campuses are not included elsewhere in this Census. Note there was a recording error in Figure 22 last year so we should not compare this table with last year's.

Furthermore, there are approximately 117 ISC affiliated schools i.e. overseas schools in membership of ISC associations. Figure 23 shows where these schools are located. Data from these schools is not included elsewhere in this Census.

Overseas campuses of ISC schools are only a small part of the landscape of British schools overseas (BSOs). The International Schools Consultancy estimates there to be over 3,000 BSOs, representing around one half of all English-medium international schools worldwide.

International Footprint: British pupils whose parents live overseas or serve in the Armed Forces

As well as non-British pupils, there are 4,219 British pupils at ISC schools whose parents serve in HM Forces. In addition there

are 4,714 other British pupils whose parents live overseas (see Appendix One: Table 13, p37 for more details).

School Fees

The average overall fee, excluding nursery fees¹, increased by 3.4% between 2017 and 2018 on a like-for-like basis i.e. between those schools completing the Census in both years. The equivalent fee rise including nursery fees was 3.5%. Last year the equivalent fee increases were 3.5% and 3.6% respectively. Fee increases are therefore slightly lower than last year and remain the lowest annual increase since 1994. Figure 24 shows how this fee increase varies by region.


Fig 25. School fees (excluding nursery fees)

As one might expect, fees vary significantly between day and boarding schools (boarding fees are typically twice that of day school fees as illustrated in Figure 25). Similarly, fees charged by schools vary by region. For example, the average fee ranges from

just under £3,500 per term for day schools in the North West to more than £5,500 per term for day schools in London (see Table 6 of Appendix One, p32 for more details).

A further illustration of the variation in fees is illustrated in Figure 26 below. For day schools, the majority of schools charge between £3,000 and £5,000 per term, but 18 schools charge under £2,000 and 22 charge over £7,000 per term reflecting the diverse offering in ISC schools.

Scholarships and Bursaries

A total of 171,488 pupils currently receive help with their fees representing 33% of all pupils⁴; the value of this help totals nearly one billion pounds, an increase of 7.8% on last year. A significant majority

(84%) of total fee assistance is provided directly from the schools themselves: ISC schools currently provide more than £800m of fee assistance, an increase of 7.2% on the previous year.

Figure 28 shows that over the past 18 years there has been a consistent trend of schools providing fee assistance to an increasing number of pupils. The only exception being a small drop in 2016.

Schools give more than twice as much means-tested assistance as opposed to non-means-tested, totalling almost £400m and representing an increase of 4% compared with last year. Bursaries and means-tested scholarships are awarded to 8% of pupils.

Figure 29 shows a breakdown of the 40,402 means-tested bursaries and the 2,575 means-tested scholarships provided by ISC schools. Nearly half of all pupils on means-tested bursaries have more than half of their fees remitted and 5,657 pay no fees at all. In contrast, means-tested scholarships tend to be smaller and over half are for less than 25%.

If we compare the information provided in Figures 27 and 29 with last year we see that fewer pupils are in receipt of means-tested fee assistance (42,977 this year compared with 43,563 last year), but the value of this help has increased to a greater extent (from £384m in 2017 to £398m this year). Furthermore, the numbers of pupils in receipt of 100% means-tested assistance has also increased (from 5,742 last year to 5,863 this year). ISC schools appear to be providing larger bursaries but to fewer students, suggesting they are directing funds to those pupils most in need.




Fig 30. Trends in means-tested bursaries and scholarships versus non-means-tested scholarships at ISC schools $(2011-2018)^1$

In recent years, there has been an overall shift from non-means-tested scholarships to means-tested bursaries and scholarships, as illustrated in Figure 30. The total value of means-tested bursaries and scholarships

provided by schools has increased by nearly £140m since 2011, a rise of 53%; the total value of non-means-tested scholarships has risen by 31% over the same period.

The range of partnerships with local state schools are summarised in Figure 31. Partnerships range from sponsoring an academy, to sharing facilities to seconding teaching staff.

In summary, 1,137 schools are involved in partnerships with state schools, equating to 86% of ISC schools. To put this figure into context, only 75% of ISC schools hold charitable status. Note information on partnerships was first collected in 2013 and the section has been evolving year on year to gain more in-depth and accurate information. This year, we specifically asked schools to only include partnerships that were active in the year to 18th January 2018. We understand some schools were including, for example, partnerships that run biennially. This year's figures should therefore give a more accurate picture.

Figure 32 is a summary of the facilities available at ISC schools. Whilst some ISC schools are very facility-rich, many are not. For example, among the 1,326 ISC schools there are 68 all-weather athletics tracks i.e. only 5% of ISC schools have athletics tracks. Assuming all these were shared with state schools, they would only serve a small fraction of the 28,000¹ state-funded schools in the UK. Collectively, 1,911 facilities are shared with local state schools. The number of state-funded schools and state-funded pupils benefiting from partnership activities is summarised in Figure 33.

On average, each of the 1,137 schools therefore work with approximately 10 schools and 200 pupils. If we aggregate the data in Figure 33 and assume that each ISC school partners with a separate state school (i.e. there is no overlap) we can conclude that as many as 11,000 state-funded schools benefit from ISC school partnerships and as many as 225,000 state pupils (one state school pupil for every 2 to 3 independent pupils). The reality is that there will be some overlap, but the extent of this overlap is difficult to estimate with any accuracy.

Finally, beyond their partnership work, 99% of ISC schools report that they have raised money for charities over the last year. In 69% of cases, the schools were able to report the total amount raised for charity. The average per school was over £12,000. Therefore it is estimated² that between £12m and £16m was raised for charity in the year 2017 to 2018. In addition, 860 ISC schools organise volunteering opportunities for their staff and / or pupils.

² Upper estimate assumes remainder schools (31%) raised funds in line with the average; lower limit assumes remainder schools raised zero funds.

Teaching Staff

A total of 58,573 full-time equivalent teachers are employed at ISC schools. The teaching profession (for the education sector as a whole) has a far greater proportion of female teachers, but this is much less pronounced at ISC schools. 38% of full-time equivalent teachers at ISC schools are men. This compares with a figure of 26% in state-funded schools¹.

A total of 9,080 full-time equivalent teaching assistants are employed at ISC schools, making up 13% of classroom staff. The equivalent proportion at state-funded schools is 37%, almost three times as high. The pupil-teacher ratio at ISC schools is 8.6:1. This compares to an average of 17.7:1 across all state-funded schools in 2016.



ISC Exam Results¹

Every August, ISC publishes exam result data for ISC schools. This data is broken down by exam type, gender and grade. In January, the Department for Education released a more detailed dataset broken down by subject. Summary statistics for subject groups, STEM and MFLs are below.


Fig 36. A-level entries as a proportion of all entries

Figure 36 displays the proportion of entries for STEM and MFL subjects for independent schools only and for all schools. This shows that independent schools enter a disproportionate number of pupils for most STEM subjects and all MFLs. For some subjects, such as French and Further Maths, independent schools enter more than twice as many candidates proportionately.




Fig 37. Proportion A*/A grades: A-level and GCSE

ISC exam result data, published in August, is based on ISC's internal exam collection exercise. Not all ISC schools submit results but the large majority do. The subject breakdown, displayed in Figures 36 and 37, is based on exam data supplied by the Department for Education (DfE). The datasets therefore vary and are not directly comparable. For example, ISC exam data is for ISC schools only, the DfE data includes all independent schools. ISC exam data is for ISC schools in the UK, the DfE data includes schools in England only. In addition, DfE appears to exclude IGCSEs (although this is not totally clear), which account for 48% of all Year 11 exam entries at ISC schools. Finally, please note that the DfE excludes data for schools where the number of entries for a particular subject is 5 or fewer. This does not have a significant impact on the STEM data as pupils enter these subjects in larger numbers, but does impact the MFL data. This data was included in previous years therefore we should be careful when making year-on-year comparisons.


A-level, proportion A*/A grades, STEM




GCSE, proportion A*/A grades, STEM excluding Mathematics

ISC results published in August 2017 revealed that nearly half of A-level entries at ISC independent schools achieve A* and A grades, nearly double the national figure. They further revealed that over 60% of GCSE/IGCSE entries by independent school pupils were awarded A* and A grades, more than three times the national average.

Figure 37 displays the proportion of top grades for STEM and MFL subjects for both A-level and GCSE. Note that for the first time last summer, GCSEs in Maths and English were assessed under the new, reformed 9-1 grading so this data is displayed separately. The charts show that both independent and state pupils achieve higher grades in many of the key STEM and MFL subjects (compared with the average for each subject) but

significant attainment gaps still remain. For example, at Chemistry A-level 50% of independent schools entries were awarded A* or A compared with 30% of state entries.

The analysis above covers GCSE and A-levels only. 5.6% of ISC pupils took the International Baccalaureate in 2017, which includes Maths, science and MFL. Figure 38 summarises some key statistics published in the IB Diploma Programme Statistical Bulletin alongside those collected for ISC schools in August 2017. Nearly half of all UK IB candidates come from ISC schools. More than four times as many ISC pupils gained 40 points compared to the worldwide average. ISC pupils made up nearly a quarter of all pupils worldwide gaining the maximum score of 45 points.

Entrance to Higher Education

The vast majority of school leavers educated at ISC schools continue to higher education. More specifically, 91% of all ISC pupils went on to higher education in 2017¹. This proportion has changed little over time.





Fig 40. Destination of ISC pupils attending UK universities: Top 20 Proportion of all ISC pupils attending UK universities

Of those continuing to higher education, 94% do so within the UK. The majority (54%) continue to a Russell Group university and 5% of ISC pupils continue to either Oxford or Cambridge. Figure 40 shows the top 20 UK universities attended by ISC pupils.

Fig 39. Higher education destination summary

The year given reflects the year pupils left their school, rather than the year that the figure was published in the Census, meaning that the most recent figure is for 2017.





Fig 42. Destination of ISC pupils going to non-UK universities: Top 10 Proportion of all ISC pupils attending non-UK universities

For the 5% of pupils that chose to study outside of the UK, the USA is by far the most popular destination attracting over 50% of ISC pupils going to overseas universities, as illustrated in Figure 41. ISC pupils go on to a wide range of overseas universities and this range has been expanding year on year. In 2012, fewer than 400 overseas institutions attracted ISC pupils, now there are almost 500. The top 10 overseas

universities are illustrated in Figure 42. The percentages are low, reflecting the wide range of overseas institutions.

Finally, pupils choosing to study overseas are not confined to a small number of ISC schools. Pupils from 61% of ISC schools go on to higher education overseas.

Fig 41. Destination of ISC pupils going to non-UK universities: Countries Proportion of all pupils attending non-UK universities


